Siena Heights Board Confirms New Trustees; Elects Officers for 1979-80 Academic Year

The confirmation of two new trustees, the election of new officers for the 1979-80 academic year, and several enlightening reports highlighted the Siena Heights College Board of Trustees meeting Saturday, May 12.

The newly elected trustees are Richard W. Keeley and Margaret Machlin Rueckert.

Keeley is president of Buckeye Products Corporation in Adrian and is a member of the President's Community Advisory Council at Siena. He is a graduate of Western Ontario University.

He has worked for Bendix, Ford Motor Company in Detroit, Whirlpool Corporation in Hamilton, Ohio, and Franklin Manufacturing Company in Minneapolis. He was also a member of the U.S. Air Force.

He is currently a member of the Adrian School Board, the local and state Chambers of Commerce and the National Federation of Independent Business. He was the United Fund chairman with the major firm division in 1971 and 1972. He and his wife, Denise, have eight children and reside in Adrian.

Mrs. Rueckert is a longtime friend and benefactor of the Adrian Dominican Sisters. Her three daughters graduated from Rosarian Academy in West Palm Beach, Florida, and one of them is a graduate of Barry College in Miami. Both schools are operated by the Dominicans. She and her father, the late Frederick Machlin, donated two buildings to the academy.

She recently donated a \$30,000 endowed scholarship, the Margaret Rueckert Scholarship, to Siena Heights.

Mrs. Rueckert is a graduate of Mount Holyoke College in South Hadley, Massachusetts. She and her husband, Charles, reside at Lighthouse Point, Florida.

Elected as chairman and vice-chairperson of the Executive Committee respectively were Willard Reagan, attorney, Stark and Reagan, P.C., Troy, Michigan, and Koselka.

Virgil Gladieux, chairman of the board, Gladieux Food Services Inc., Toledo, was named chairman of the nominating committee.

Chester Devenow stepped down as chairman of the board after serving in that capacity since 1976. He has been a member of the board since 1972. He was recently elected vice-chairman of the Ohio State University Board.

Devenow was presented with gifts from the college administration, the board, and student body and was voted Trustee Emeritus for his years of service.

"Siena Heights has a strong faculty, staff, president, and board," said Devenow. "Its future looks bright and is in great hands."

Devenow finished his role as chairman by presenting diplomas at the Siena

commencement exercises Sunday, May 13.

Gladieux, chairman of the development committee, reported that fiscal goals were surpassed during the first ten months due to the support of parents, alums, foundations, businesses, and individuals. The number of donors has tripled from last year.

The trustees were informed about the installation of a new computer system that will be operational in the fall. The computer will be used for instructional research, administrative activities, and advance courses in computer languages and application.

\$110,000 Grant Received From Local Foundation

Siena Heights College received a \$110,000 grant from a local foundation wishing to remain anonymous for the start of the new fiscal year which began July 1. \$100,000 of the grant was designated for the general fund and \$10,000 for scholarships.

"This recent grant of \$110,000 is appreciated all the more because the giving foundation has once again demonstrated its confidence in the quality of our programs and students," said Siena President Dr. Louis C. Vaccaro.

In addition, a total of nearly one-half million dollars from 15 foundations was awarded to Siena during the past fiscal year which ended June 30. The grants have been earmarked for scholarship aid, library improvement, academic program strengthening, and general support.

"We are delighted with the fact that the college has attracted these needed gifts and grants," said Vaccaro. "More than anything it tells us that a wide range of foundation officials believe in what we're doing."

Siena Heights has operated on balanced budgets every year since its founding in 1919.

Celebrities Honored at Siena

Steve Allen and Jayne Meadows were awarded honorary doctorate degrees by Siena Heights Sept. 6 in Francoeur Theatre.

The Allens were presented Doctor of Humane Letters for their involvement in the Public Broadcasting Service's award-winning "Meeting of Minds" series which is one of Allen's latest pioneering ventures in the entertainment-media world. The program is created, written, produced, directed and hosted by Allen (he wrote the theme song as well) and most of the leading female roles are played by Meadows.

The husband-wife team was honored for offering viewing audiences a unique example of television as an educational vehicle, for the 18 years of perseverance it took to make the idea a reality, and for the "mind-stretching" that "Meeting of Minds" has harvested in the public consciousness.

"Meeting of Minds" became a reality in 1977, following persistent prodding by PBS Station KCET in Los Angeles and Loring D'Usseau, executive producer of the series. The initial season was fully underwritten by E.F. Hutton Company. PBS, encouraged by unanimous acclaim from both critics and viewers, renewed Allen's pact for a second and third season.

In "Meeting of Minds" actors portray various historical characters from different time periods in a hypothetical gathering and exchange views and ideas on topics from authority of Church and science to romantic love. Meadows has portrayed such personalities as Cleopatra, Marie Antoinette, and Susan B. Anthony. In 1978 she received

an Emmy nomination for her portrayal of the 90-year-old Florence Nightingale. Some of the male characters have included Galileo, Martin Luther, and Attila the Hun.

The series has won the 1978 Peabody Award, the 1977 TV Critics Circle Award and the 1978 Film Advisory Board Award. The pilot presentation won three Emmys and Allen was given a special award for creating, writing and producing the program.

Allen has an obsession for education. "It was suddenly clear to me that as an individual's knowledge increases he becomes more aware that what he knows, and all that he can ever know, is like a grain of sand compared to the Sahara..." says Allen. "I buy books as if they were jelly beans."

The convocation ceremony also included a "Meeting of Minds" presentation by Siena Heights Faculty.

Siena faculty involved in the presentation were: host, Dr. Robert Gordon, assistant professor of humanities; St. Thomas Aquinas, Dr. Barbara Wall, O.P., assistant professor of philosophy; Emily Dickinson, Dr. Mary Louise Hall, O.P., associate professor of English; Erza Pound, Dr. James R. McDonald, assistant professor of English; St. Raymond of Capua, David J. Van Horn, CPPS, associate professor of art; and William Shakespeare, Glenn Crane, associate professor of communication arts.



Associate Deans Named

Dr. Barbara Wall, O.P., assistant professor of philosophy, and Dr. Eugene Chapman, assistant professor of biology, have been appointed associate deans of Student Development. The pair replaces Dr. Robert Cares, who held the position for three years, and will share the duties of the office and remain active faculty members.

As associate deans, Wall and Chapman will be responsible for campus safety, athletics, campus ministry, counseling, residence halls, and campus cultural activities. Both say that they feel the time is right for a change in the operation and integration of student development as an academic vehicle for students.

"The student development program is very important because students spend 80 percent of their time outside the classroom," said Wall. "Student development is part of the whole academic environment, providing support and helping to create a living-learning atmosphere for the students, an important concern for the educational quality of the Siena environment."

Chapman and Wall agree that the team concept will be a success. As faculty, they say they feel that they are better qualified to integrate student development with academics because they are known by students as faculty members and not just administrators. "Being visible is not necessarily being known," said Chapman.

"I feel all administrators should teach," said Wall. "I feel this involvement would bring the college community closer together and be beneficial to the educational atmosphere."

According to Chapman, part of the student development program involves the implementation of traditions within the college, and helping students become aware of how important these traditional ideas are in the college environment.

In announcing the appointment of the new deans, President Louis Vaccaro said, "We are delighted that Gene Chapman and Barb Wall have agreed to take on this important assignment. Both have already proven themselves popular teachers, committed to the welfare of the college and the students. We look forward to continued growth and improvement in the whole area of student development."

Chapman, a native of Nyack, New York, received his bachelors degree from Bowling Green University, his masters from Columbia University and his doctorate from Pennsylvania State University. He has been at Siena three years, having previously taught at Millersville State College and Allegheny College in Pennsylvania.

Wall received her bachelors degree from Fordham University, and her master and doctoral degrees from Marquette University. She has been at Siena for three years, and previously taught at Villanova University for six years. She is from Yonkers, New York.

Siena Heights College conferred 314 degrees for students completing degrees in August 1978, December 1978, and May 1979 at commencement exercises last May 13. Degrees conferred included 211 bachelors, 48 masters, and 55 associate degrees.

Siena and the Board of Trustees recognized spiritual leadership, scholastic and political achievement, educational values, and humanitarianism by conferring the Siena Medal upon Dorothy Day and honorary degrees upon Rev. Virgilio Elizondo, **Barbara Oess Dumouchelle**, Most Reverend Carroll T. Dozier, and Dr. Stanley J. Idzerda at the commencement. Idzerda was also the commencement speaker.

Day, editor of the **Catholic Worker** and co-founder of the Catholic Worker Movement, was recognized for her Christian values and social caring. Whenever a social issue has challenged the American conscience, the Movement has taken a stand and Dorothy Day has been in the forefront. Now in her 80's, she is still the driving force behind the Movement which opposes economic exploitation, war, taxes, racial injustice, and continues to soothe the poor and disadvantaged.

Due to illness, Day was unable to attend the commencement. Accepting the Siena Medal, the college's highest honor, was Dorothy Gauchet, a close friend of Day and fellow Catholic Worker.

Elizondo is the president of the nationally acclaimed Mexican American Cultural Center in San Antonio, Texas. He has done television work, including the preparation and narration of ABC's national Christmas special, "Feliz Navidad...A Mexican American Christmas," in 1972 which was nominated for an Emmy Award as Best Religious Program of the Year. He was recognized by the board for his involvement with the poor and oppressed, especially members of the Latino community in the United States.

Siena Heights Confers 314 Degrees

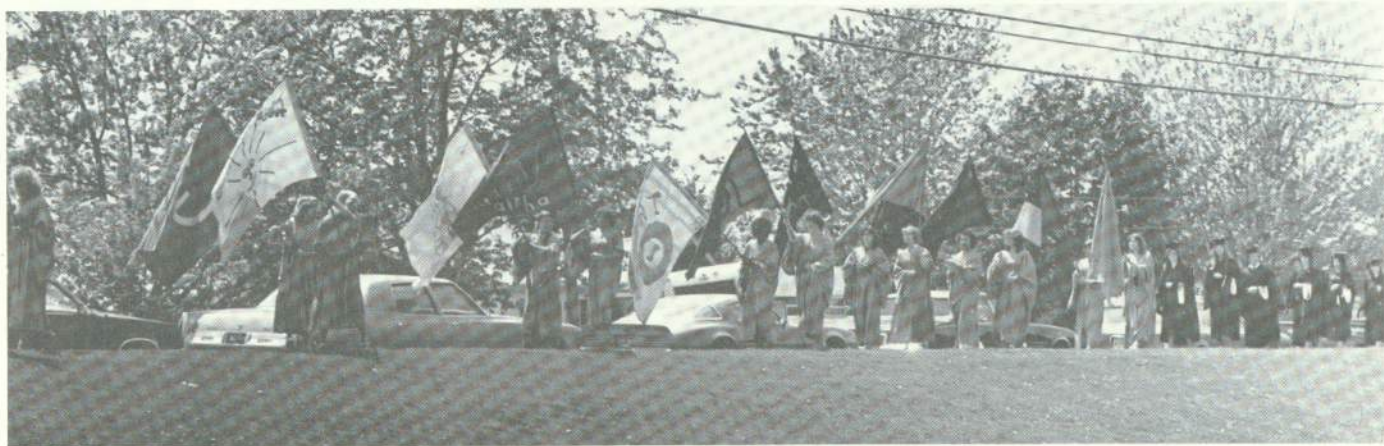
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Dumouchelle, a native of Adrian and a Siena alumna, was appointed, and later re-elected to the Michigan Board of Education through 1986. She served as treasurer of the board in 1973-74 and currently holds that position through 1980. She was president of the Siena Alumni Association in 1959-60. Since leaving Siena she has been an elementary school teacher, a delegate to Japan under the auspices of the Japan-United States Friendships Commission educational exchange, and a member of the 16th District Republican Committee.

Dozier, D.D., the Bishop in Memphis, Tennessee, is best known in Memphis and by Catholics throughout the world for his Reconciliation Services in Memphis and Jackson, Tennessee, during 1976, welcoming all Catholics who had not been attending church back to the fold. More than 12,000

people attended the services in Memphis, and his work is creating great strides in the religious instruction of the diocese.

Idzerda is the editor-in-chief of the Lafayette Papers at Cornell University, concerning the Marquis de Lafayette of France. He has taught European and

American History at Western Reserve University, Western Michigan University, Wesleyan University, Yale University, and the College of Saint Benedict. He was also the dean of the college at Wesleyan and president at Saint Benedict.

General Studies Division Appoints Bukwaz, Gordon To New Positions

Norm Bukwaz was recently appointed director of Siena's External Degree Programs and Services. He has been the chairman of the General Studies Division at the college for two years.

Bukwaz will be responsible for the External Degree Program in Southfield, Michigan, which permits working adult students in the Metropolitan Detroit area to complete their bachelor degrees. The program was created in 1977.

He will also coordinate the Siena Heights-Lourdes College "Two Plus Two" program in business administration and management. This program allows Toledo

area students to earn a bachelors degree by attending a combination of Siena and Lourdes courses on the Lourdes campus. The program was created two years ago and enrolls nearly 100 students, 35 of whom are attending junior-senior level classes offered by Siena. The program's first four graduates received their bachelors degrees in May.

Bukwaz will also market Siena's academic programs to adult students in the region through advertising and information sessions for interested organizations and individuals.

Dr. Robert Gordon will replace Bukwaz as chairman of the General Studies Division.

Gordon has been the director of academic advising, a position he will retain. The General Studies Division houses the offices of academic advising, skill development, career planning, cooperative education, and placement.

Chinese Educators Welcomed

Dream to Study in U.S. Realized

Margaret and Jane Chi of the People's Republic of China have been awarded graduate assistantships while they pursue their masters degrees in education at Siena during the current academic year.

The sisters have been teaching at a middle school in Tsingtao for a number of years. They each received their bachelors degrees from Aurora College in Shanghai.

Margaret first became interested in Siena Heights in 1948 when she was awarded a full four-year scholarship to pursue her college education at Siena. Due to political entanglements at the time, she was unable to take advantage of the offer. Thirty-one years

later, her dream has come true.

Two other Chinese graduate students from Changchun will also pursue their masters degrees this fall. Their opportunity came about through a meeting between Siena President Dr. Louis Vaccaro and Professor Wang-Kun, chairman of the foreign language department at Kirin University in Northern China, when Vaccaro traveled to China in 1978.

Wang-Kun will also teach at Siena during the 1979-80 academic year.

Selected Siena faculty may have an opportunity to teach in China in the near future due to this exchange.

He will teach Metal Arts for the Siena Art Division.

James Hoytenga was a property manager for Consolidated Papers Inc. in Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin, before coming to Siena. Prior to that, he had been a market research, sales management, and advertising instructor at Tri-State University in Angola, Indiana. Values Dimension of Miss

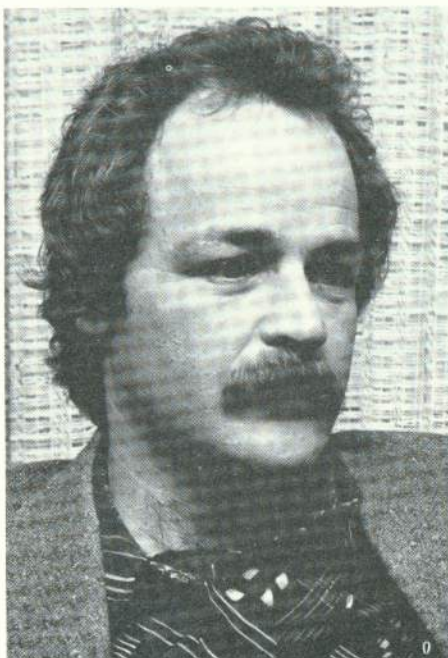
One morning in early August a small group of Siena Heights faculty and staff gathered informally for a discussion on the topic of values at Siena. The participants were James Ebben, dean of the college; Dr. Sharon Weber, O.P., chairperson of the Natural Science Division and assistant professor of chemistry; Dr. Spencer Bennett, associate professor of history and religion; Charles "Pat" Palmer, Siena's new director of athletics; and Dr. Eugene Chapman, associate dean of students and assistant professor of biology. The following are excerpts from that hour-long meeting:

Question: In the college's mission statement we emphasized the values dimension of the college. From your perspective what does it mean and how is it working?

Ebben: The philosophy of the college states that it has evolved within the framework of Catholicism as lived out within the Adrian Dominican tradition, and in that context, it provides encounters with values which are part of that tradition. In the student section of the catalog we say that we believe the college should provide encounters with moral dilemmas for students in hopes that these may lead to greater ethical sensitivity.

Question: Well, with that being the mission statement, how are these things being provided?

Ebben: We can turn to our values program which includes Values I, II and III. The first course deals with values clarification where the student deals with personal values, the second with ethical values, and the third with

religious values. The courses don't reach all of our students however, but is a sequence of courses that receives a lot of attention.

Weber: I think one of the advantages of being constantly aware of the mission statement, since it's relatively new, is the fact that all of us (faculty and staff) are taking a hard look at the embedded core (the college's required courses) and are very aware of the kinds of things we ought to be looking at in the various academic programs. In science for example, we can look at values that are inherent in the scientific method...like carefulness in taking data, honesty in reporting it, and lack of bias in reviewing the results. Some of the things that science has allowed man to do definitely raises moral questions. We now have the ability to investigate if someone is living or dead in terms of brain waves. Are we talking about life or human life? Those are questions we certainly raise in the classroom. I'm sure other disciplines are doing the same kind of things.

Chapman: Another thing in terms of science concerns health-related activities and equipment. We have reached a point where we often have to decide who lives and who dies because of the availability or lack of availability of certain equipment...for example, dialysis machines and that type of thing.

Palmer: We're talking about students who come here from all different backgrounds and lifestyles. Some have been raised in Dominican schools all along. My background

is Jesuit related. When someone asks me what are the Jesuits' values, I tell them I never had a course in what they value, but I know what I value and my values tend to come from that background mixed with my family background. Any college is going to have input into the value growth of an individual, and I think when you have a faculty that is more than half Dominicans those values are going to rub off. In recruiting students, I was talking with a student from a Protestant background. His mom asked, "Is he going to have to attend church services?" and I said, "No, but his values will change." And I can't say how they're going to change. It depends on values he comes in with in the first place and what changes he sees necessary. Students will share a lot of values changing in the dorm. We're talking about peer values then...all of a sudden a small farming community student meets up with a student from a big metropolitan area and there's going to be some clashing of values. Hopefully by the time a student leaves college his values have evolved. Maybe his original values will become more concrete or maybe he'll change. I don't think we're all permanent in our values. A lot of my values have changed.

Ebben: The question then becomes, what does the college do with the situation which you have described? One of the things we say the college does is that it helps the students to examine the assumption upon which they are basing their lives. Part of the examination is going to come from dorm life where students are confronting other

students with different values. The college is providing an environment for that examination and providing counseling when they're (students) confused by encountering so many different values systems.

Chapman: I think students are exposed to many more values than they're accustomed to, but I question if they really change. The reason I say that is the students have had their own values for 18, 19 or 20 years or so, and I don't think four years of college will change many of the values they brought with them. Some will change, but most will just become more tolerant and aware of others' values.

Bennett: Certainly there's concern about how student values change from freshman to senior year, but I think the larger question that the mission statement addresses is... what is unique about the environment that Siena provides or the value element in a student's life while he or she is here? I don't know if providing a pluralistic environment is necessarily the answer, although it might be part of it. And certainly there is an element of a marketplace of ideas in the Dominican tradition since they are teachers. But I wouldn't find that a fully satisfactory answer to the question of what is it we do, that if not sets us apart, at least provides a specific response to the mission statement?

Weber: I think to some degree that's what the faculty's grappling with on the college core issue right now concerning what kind of core we should have. We decided to request that students take a Philosophy of Person

course in order to explore the human life issue in our science courses. It's that kind of consideration that the whole faculty is facing... what should we really ask the students to take?

Ebben: I think it's not so much providing the setting where the encounters with other values take place, but in providing some kind of framework for the examination of those values. So it's not that I accept mine and am tolerant of yours, but what makes mine worth holding on to and what makes yours worth holding on to or is there anything worth holding on to at all? So what we do is provide a set of questions students can examine, and the set of questions is coming out of this Dominican tradition.

Palmer: I would disagree with what Gene says... that people don't change their values within their four years of college. I think they do. But maybe I'm coming from the 60's era where I saw a lot of people come into school and within three or four years they were different. A lot of people were looking. Maybe the 60's are gone, maybe young people aren't searching as much as they were in the 60's.

Chapman: I don't think you can tell if they've changed while here, it's after they leave college. Then you can look back and see how successful the programs have been.

Ebben: Studies have shown that students change very little intellectually through their college years, but they do change dramatically in their values.

Bennett: Let's put the question another way and maybe this gets at part of my concern.

Does Siena offer some alternatives to the external world of the 70's which seems to be becoming a world in which the individual tends to isolate himself more and more from the larger social setting for various reasons? If you are a child of the 60's as I was, at least in part, what one remembers about that period was student awareness of a much larger social and political community out there. What strikes me about the 70's is the opposite. Students don't want to deal with the world because they feel they only have enough resources to try and make their own way in the world. The Dominicans have a larger sense of community that is so much a part of the Dominican tradition. How could we make that sense of community a part of the Siena experience for students?... So that when they leave after four years and go into the real world where it seems to be individual against individual they could say, "wait a minute! I've experienced something else and it seems to me that experience is prior to the values the external world is trying to inflict upon me."

Weber: I think the values courses do open up the whole social consciousness with the larger community issues of the 70's, the trip to Washington D.C., etc. We have also done some things in the science area by taking the students to public hearings and lectures and perhaps more things like that in the various departments will build an awareness of what is out there.

Palmer: Within athletics there's a lot of values statements to be concerned about. About winning itself, and the cost of winning. What attitude do you take? Maybe each department deals with values in its own way. For the value of quality of life, I go along with the physically fit body and sound mind... you can't have one without the other. I guess you can, but it doesn't work as efficiently.

Chapman: What we are is what we teach and our values are what we express in the classroom whether we like it or not.

Ebben: One of the institutional goals stated in the catalog says that the college will epitomize its own structure and favor a society in which each individual involved may have maximum opportunities for personal growth and for participation in the life of the college community. I guess this indicates that the growth of the community and the growth of the individual go hand in hand.

Although this particular discussion was recorded, the topic of values and the college core is part of an ongoing dialogue between faculty and staff throughout the year.

Transition, Unity, Growth Ahead



The 1979-80 athletic season at Siena Heights College will be a year of transition, unity, growth, and stiffer competition according to new Siena Athletic Director Charles "Pat" Palmer.

"We're making strides to upgrade the whole department," said Palmer. "We want to involve the entire student body and increase the use of the facility. We offer three levels of participation: the varsity, club sport, and intramural levels.

"Athletics will play an important role for the complete development of the mind, body, and spirit. We're developing a quality program here, where the athletes will have to perform to the best of their ability in the classroom as well as on the field."

One of the changes made this year was to drop womens athletics from the Southeastern Michigan Womens Athletic Conference.

"We did this to allow the womens teams the freedom to choose the teams they want to play," said Palmer. "If we find a conference we want to join, then we'll join it, but in the meantime we'll play independently."

Mens varsity sports include cross country, track, wrestling, basketball, baseball, golf, and tennis. Palmer hopes that soccer, presently a club sport, will be added to the varsity level in the near future. Womens varsity sports include volleyball, basketball, tennis, and softball.

New members of the athletic department include graduate assistants Jim Holder, wrestling coach; Rich Holman, assistant cross country and track coach; Julie Lippins, assistant womens basketball and head softball coach; and Bob Catherina, soccer coach.

Returning members of the department are Ben Braun, mens basketball and baseball coach; Mary Alice Murnen, O.P., womens

basketball coach; Fred Smith, golf and J.V. basketball coach; Curt Collins, mens tennis coach; Kathi Lynch, womens tennis and volleyball coach; and Paul Bodenbach, trainer. Palmer will coach cross country and track. Lynch has also taken over duties as facility coordinator and head of the athletic work study program. Chris Molloy will be director of the intramural sports program.

Palmer said the goals for the cross country team are to go to the Nationals and for Siena to produce a couple of All-Americans. Large invitational meets are being planned to provide strong competition and exposure. One of the top recruits is Pat Wakefield of Adrian High School.

"This should be the best cross country team in the school's history," said Palmer.

Returning starters from last year's 23-7 mens basketball team will be 6'6" Dan Tarrant, leading rebounder last season; Tyrone Wilson and Al Sandifer, co-captains for the 1979-80 season; D'Jon Wimberly, Tyrone Richardson, and Bruce Swart. Top area recruits include Dave Pawson, Onsted High School, and the leading scorer in the county last year with 23.7 scoring average; Dave Porter, Clinton High School; and Paul Dazey, Madison High School.

Returning for the womens basketball team will be Peg Mulherin, Wendy Schwark, Mona White, Carol Crissey, Deidre Driver, Lannall Campbell, Regina Rand, and Cheryl O'Neill. Barb Smith, who figured prominently at Siena three years ago, will be returning to Siena as a sophomore. The womens season will include two pre-season tournaments: Nov. 30-Dec. 1 at the Siena Activities Center and Dec. 7-8 at Hope College in Holland, Michigan. The team was 23-0 last year.

Returning starters from last year's

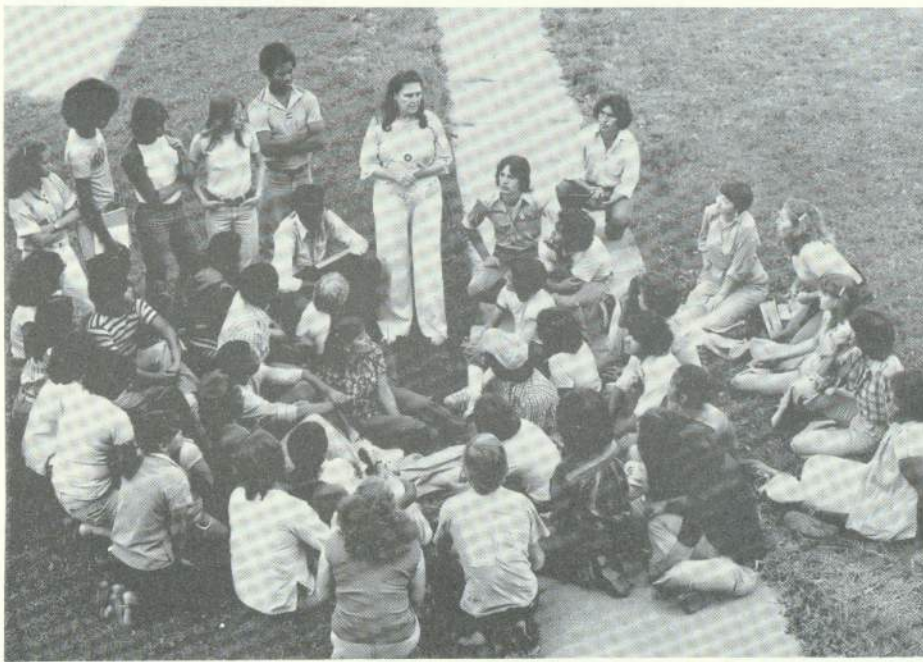
womens volleyball team are Captain Kathy Wyderko, Kelly Gerard, Barb Herta, and Wendy Schwark. The highlight of the season will be a tournament Oct. 20 at the Siena Heights Activities Center.
