\$6.5 Million Commitment to Excellence Program Launched May 17

Siena Heights officially launched its three-year \$6.5 million Commitment to Excellence program at Travis Pointe Country Club in Saline, Michigan, May 17.

The event was highlighted by a meeting of the Siena Heights National Leadership Committee. Major commitments of \$2.3 million were announced by the National Leadership Committee chairmen.

The Commitment to Excellence program is designed to raise \$6.5 million for capital expenditures, a cash endowment, and operating expenses. The funds will be used for the following: \$1.7 million operational support for scholarships and strengthening academic programs, \$1,600,000 for a 15,000 sq. ft. library addition (including an additional 38,000 library holdings), \$694,000 for general remodeling and renovation, \$294,000 for capital equipment, \$212,000 for expansion and upgrading of parking facilities, and \$2 million for endowment.

"Area residents are benefiting from Siena Heights College more today than at any other time in the history of the

college," said Natalia Koselka, attorney, Koselka and Koselka, Adrian, and a member of the Siena Heights College Board of Trustees. "I believe that many Lenawee County friends will endorse the Commitment to Excellence program and work for it."

"There are a lot of people in this county that have and are receiving an education at Siena—for many of them, an education they wouldn't get if it weren't for Siena Heights. Many of those people are employees of Brazeway, continuing their own education or educating their children," said Stephen Hickman, chief executive officer, Brazeway, Inc. "My motive is selfish; as an employer, I want Siena Heights. I want it healthy, growing, and improving. The success of this program will help assure that future."

"I feel confident that Siena Heights College has captured a sense of excitement that few private colleges can claim during this difficult period of uncertainty," said Richard K. Ransom, a member of the national leadership committee and chairman of the board of

trustees. "Those of us who are privileged to serve the college as trustees are committed to continue the current forward thrust of this institution."

Dr. Louis C. Vaccaro responded, "As we enter a new decade we're in a strong position to meet new challenges. Since its founding in 1919, Siena Heights College has operated with balanced budgets and no capital or operating debt. Also encouraging is the fact that enrollment for the 1979-80 academic year was up eight percent for full-time students and 20 percent for part-time students. We expect another increase in enrollment of approximately nine percent for the 1980-81 year."

Siena Heights currently enrolls 1,500 men and women from 25 states and 21 foreign countries. More than 40 percent of the students are in the non-traditional age bracket, with the average student over 27 years of age. Forty percent of the courses are offered in the late afternoons and evenings to benefit these students.

Siena Heights also provides off-campus education at its external degree centers in Southfield, Michigan, and at Lourdes College in Sylvania, Ohio.

Construction Underway for Library Addition; Completion Set for Jan. '81

Siena Heights College held its official groundbreaking ceremony for its 15,000 sq. ft. library addition March 14. Construction is underway by the Kreighoff-Lenawee Company and is expected to be completed by the end of the calendar year.

The \$1.6 million project will allow the library to expand its holdings to 150,000 and provide more study space for students. The new building will also house a rare book room and include seminar rooms and classrooms. Other additions include advanced audio-tutorial learning machines, and various microfilm and microfiche machines.

The present library is 16,350 sq. ft. and accommodates 97,000 holdings, with strong areas in religion, philosophy and education. It also includes an excellent art and literature collection.

Although unable to attend the groundbreaking, Adrian Mayor Norman Haft supplied a statement which was read by Siena President Dr. Louis C.

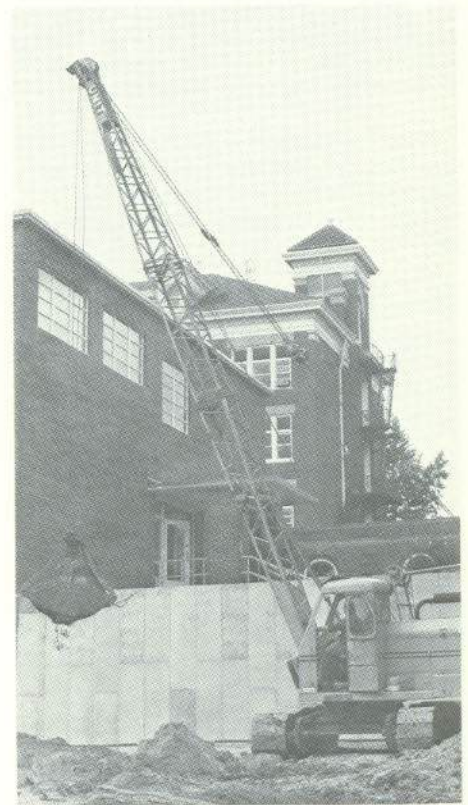
Vaccaro: "The perception in the community is that Siena Heights is on the move in the most positive way. Nothing symbolizes that more than the expansion of the library. The library is the soul of any academic institution and this significant addition is further evidence of the further growth of Siena. As mayor of the City of Adrian, I am delighted to have Siena as a tremendous asset and resource for our community."

"I am pleased that the trustees have agreed to proceed with this project because the library is the very heart of any academic institution," said Vaccaro. "As our programs and enrollments have increased during the past five or six years, it has become increasingly apparent that the library had to keep pace with this growth. This carefully designed learning-resource center will permit the college to strengthen its already strong programs and expand its services to meet the needs of our growing and diversified student body."

"On behalf of the board of trustees, I am delighted to be here and to participate in this symbolic ceremony," said Chairman of the Board Richard Ransom, chairman and chief executive officer of Hickory Farms of Ohio, Inc. "It signifies yet another significant step in the continuing development of a fine institution."

Among the principals in the ceremony were Ransom, Vaccaro, Carol Johannes, O.P., prioress of the Adrian Dominican Congregation; Gerald Diehl, board member and president of Diehl and Diehl Architects; Dr. Sharon Weber, O.P., chairperson of the teaching faculty assembly; Mark Dombrowski, director of instructional services; Marie Carol Hurley, O.P., of the campus ministry team; and student Susan Nichols.

This is the second major construction project at the college in the last two years, the other being the 57,000 sq. ft. Siena Activities Center which was dedicated in the fall of 1978.

Sr. Theresa Kane Awarded Siena's Highest Honor at the College's 59th Commencement

Theresa Kane, R.S.M., president of the Sisters of Mercy of the Union in the United States and president of the Leadership Conference of Women Religious, was recognized for her Christian values, social caring, and commitment to the future of women in the Church and society when she was awarded the Siena Medal, Siena Heights' highest honor, at its 59th commencement exercises Sunday, May 11.

Kane was recently presented with the 1980 U.S. Catholic Award for furthering the cause of women.

Kane was the center of controversy last October when she welcomed Pope John Paul II to Washington, D.C. In that address she publicly urged the pope to provide "the possibility of women being included in all ministries in the church."

Vicaress of the Adrian Dominican

Generalate Dr. Nadine Foley, O.P., praised Kane during the ceremony saying, "For your courage in setting before Pope John Paul II the contemporary issue of women to which the Church in its struggle to be faithful to its call for reverence and dignity to all persons must respond, we salute you. Your moment of truth continues to echo in the minds and hearts of many as a sign of hope, an example of creative leadership, and a claim upon the rights of women to stand as equals in the world's courts of influence."

Kane, a native of New York City, was recently re-elected to a four-year term as administrator general of the 5,000 members of the Sisters of Mercy of the Union. Through her many speaking engagements she continues to speak out against sexism and works toward justice for women in the church.



259 Degrees Conferred at 59th Commencement

The college's 59th commencement ceremony was held in the Siena Activities Center for the first time in the history of the institution with 259 degrees conferred—183 bachelors, 22 masters, and 54 associate degrees.

Three Receive Honorary Degrees at Graduation Ceremonies

Siena Heights and its Board of Trustees recognized spiritual leadership, scholastic and political achievement, educational values, and humanitarianism when they conferred honorary degrees upon three people who exemplify a combination of these qualities at the college's commencement exercises May 11. These people were honored in commemoration of the 600th anniversary of the death of Catherine of Siena, the college's patron.

The recipients were Carol Coston, O.P., Dr. Lloyd M. Cofer, and Dr. Donita Sullivan.

Coston is the executive director and board member of NETWORK, a Catholic social justice lobby in Washington D.C. She also serves on the Common Cause National Board and chairs the Adrian Dominican Corporate Investment Board.

She had previously served as a board member of Bread for the World, New Directions, the National Center for Urban Ethnic Affairs, the Adrian Dominican Independent School System, the Interreligious Task Force on United States Food Policy, and the Religious Committee for the Equal Rights Amendment.

Coston has worked as an educator in Michigan, Puerto Rico, and Florida. She worked with the Neighborhood Youth Corps, a program for high school dropouts funded by the Department of Labor. She was a special services director for two low income housing projects in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, and organized an infant-care center and a voter

registration drive. She has given numerous public presentations on the ERA.

Coston was a delegate to the United Bishops' Conference, "Call to Action," and the International Women's Year Conference in Houston. She received her bachelors degree from Barry College and masters degree from Catholic University of America.

Cofer, who recently died, was a retired Michigan State University professor emeritus of administration and higher education and special assistant to the president. During his 50 year career, he was the first black counselor in the Detroit Public School System, principal of Detroit Mackenzie High School, and widened the scope of the Detroit Project to include all of Michigan with regard to white and black students who suffer economically, culturally, and educationally.

Cofer served as National Chairman of the American Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges, was a member of the Executive Committee of the Council of Post-Secondary Accreditation in America, and also a member of the Board of Directors of the American Council of Education in Washington, D.C. He also served as chairman of the Central Michigan University Board of Trustees on three occasions.

Sullivan graduated *magna cum laude* from Siena Heights College and graduated second in her class from St. Louis University School of Medicine. She

did her internship at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit and her residency in pediatrics at Children's Hospital of Michigan. She later became senior resident at Children's Hospital and a research associate at Wayne State University School of Medicine.

Sullivan began her career as a clinical instructor with the Department of Pediatrics and Communicable Diseases at the University of Michigan Medical Center in 1959. She was promoted to assistant professor in 1962, associate professor in 1969, and full professor in 1977.

Sullivan has served on the University of Michigan Center Committee since 1966. She has written extensively in the area of arthritis and related diseases that afflict children. She has served for eight years on the Siena Heights College Board of Trustees and is chairperson consultant to Catholic Social Services of Wayne County.

The finance and executive committees gave reports and reviewed the 1980-81 operating budget of nearly \$5 million. Executive Committee Chairman Willard Reagan noted that paid enrollments for 1980-81 are ahead of last year's record

enrollment.

James Ebben, dean of the college, reporting for the planning committee, discussed the revised five-year financial forecast which showed marked improvement in the financial condition of the college. The planning meetings which resulted in the forecast were conducted by Borge Reimer.

Dr. Horace King, chairman of the academic affairs committee, told the board that the management division is working to develop a graduate program in management studies that could be operational for the 1980-81 academic year.

The board set Oct. 18, Feb. 7, and May 9 as the dates for next year's meetings.

The current Siena Heights board numbers 33 members and includes 11 sub-committees.

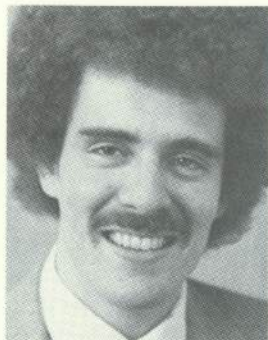
Siena Alumni Join Admissions Staff; Marshall Promoted

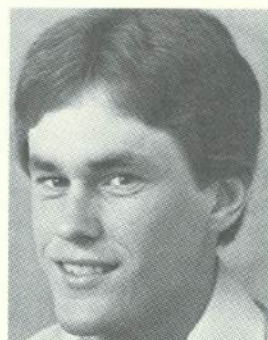

Effective this Fall

New Academic Major in Banking and Finance

A major in Banking and Finance which will be effective in the fall of 1980 was recently approved by the Siena Heights College Board of Trustees. It had previously been approved by the college's curriculum committee and teaching faculty assembly.

Development of the major began in the summer of 1978 at the suggestion of a Siena board member and several executives from the Lenawee County banking community. At that time, Buzz Walzem and Chuck Milliken, assistant professors of business at Siena, contacted all Lenawee County banks and financial institutions and the local American Institute of Banking Committee (AIB) to develop preliminary plans for the Institute of Financial Management, a sequence of banking and finance courses at Siena Heights. The college received special funding for the program.

Dr. Ben Stevenson was hired as the

director of the Institute of Financial Management in the summer of 1979. A banking advisory committee, made up of local banking executives, assisted in the search to fill Stevenson's position, and recommended and staffed the initial courses. The present courses are taught by full-time Siena faculty and specialists from the local financial community.

"I teach finance as a practical reality of today," said Stevenson. "It's not just dealing with numbers, but rather a combination of accounting, economics, bank operation and management in one major."

Stevenson stressed that banks are large employers with 14,000 banks in the United States. Therefore, there is a need for people with specialized education in banking and finance to meet the managerial needs of those institutions.

"The most important thing is to have practical experience in a financial

institution," Stevenson noted, "but the importance of theoretical classroom experience shouldn't be forgotten. It is necessary to complement practical experience with knowledge of the theories that substantiate it."

"The major in banking and finance is another instance of Siena's responsiveness to the needs of the surrounding communities," said Jim Ebben, dean of the college. "The new program is designed to prepare financial managers of the future."

Courses in the Banking and Finance major include personal finance, principles of bank operation, principles of managerial finance, money and banking, principles of risk and insurance, financial statement analysis, installment lending, real estate finance, commercial lending, investments, security analysis, bank management and more.

Upward Bound Student Interns Recognized

Several Siena Heights Upward Bound students were honored at a spring reception April 18 at Weber Center. According to Karen Glaser, director of Upward Bound at Siena, the reception was a culmination of the Student Intern-Faculty Mentorship program sponsored by Upward Bound.

Students involved in the program participated in a research project by assisting a faculty member in an area of interest. Glaser stated that the students and faculty members found the experience a highly rewarding one, and commented that the purpose of the program was to give these students an opportunity to learn and utilize research skills while getting applicable experience in the field. Each faculty member was paired with one or two student assistants, and the students spent approximately ten hours a week on the projects.

Students were selected by the Upward Bound staff and selections were based upon academic excellence. Parents, faculty, and students attended the reception.

\$288,000 SDIP Grant to Expand and Strengthen Academic Programs

Siena Heights recently received a \$288,000 Strengthening Developing Institutions Program (SDIP) Grant from the Federal Office of Education. The SDIP Grant will extend over a two-year period and involve four major areas, according to James Ebben, dean of the college. The grant will allow Siena to continue the needed expansion and strengthening that began under an original AIDP Grant during 1976-80.

Curriculum Enrichment is one main area of concentration. This program will bring visiting professors to the campus for lectures and consultation, and provide faculty grants for research.

The Freshmen Mentor Program, designed to strengthen freshmen orientation and advising, will be implemented through the grant funding as well. Other emphasis will be placed on improving the writing and math skills of students, and the college's management information system, as well as computer capabilities for instructional purposes.

Other grant-related activities include enriching the cultural life and opportunities of Siena students and providing intellectually challenging programs for academically superior students.

Basic Christian Ethics will cover the Christian response to contemporary ethical issues such as marriage and divorce, abortion, human rights, and

Fees for each course are \$40 plus text books. College credit is available at a higher cost and requires extra work.

Siena President Recruits and Lectures in China

Dr. Louis C. Vaccaro visited the Peoples' Republic of China during late June and early July. Vaccaro was invited by Professor Tang Au-ching, president of Jilin University, and the Ministry of Education in Peking.

Vaccaro spent three weeks in mainland China serving as a consultant and presenting public lectures at Jilin University. He also gave a public lecture at Peking University. Vaccaro spent time in Hong Kong and Taiwan as well, where he visited Taiwan National University and the family of Siena student May Chune Ko. He also interviewed prospective graduate and undergraduate students who have indicated an interest in attending Siena.

Vaccaro said the opportunity to visit China was prompted by the efforts of the Chinese government to rebuild the educational system which suffered a severe setback during the 10-year Cultural Revolution. This was Vaccaro's second trip to China in two years.

Alternative to Tenure Discussed by Vaccaro

President Louis C. Vaccaro has recommended a unique and controversial alternative to the traditional tenure system embraced by most American colleges and universities.

In a paper delivered at the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters at Wayne State University, Vaccaro strongly suggested the alternative which, if adopted, would lead to the elimination of academic tenure.

He pointed out that tenure was established to guarantee the academic freedom of professors during the time in which freedom was seriously threatened. However, he said that the academic freedom of today's faculty is sufficiently protected by the 1st and 14th amendments making the current system

of tenure unnecessary.

He illustrated this point by stating that the traditional system can inhibit the educational quality of the institution by severely limiting the possibilities of educational reform and by forcing university administrators and department chairpeople to fire some of their best and most promising professors.

The Siena Heights president suggests the "contract for service" alternative. He said a number of colleges have already adopted this arrangement and he believes increasing numbers of colleges will adopt it within the next decade. Hampshire College and Curry College in Massachusetts and Barry College in Florida have recently adopted the alternative system of faculty service.

Vaccaro noted that Siena Heights, which is currently enrolling 1500 students with a faculty of 100, has never had a system of tenure.

With the proposed alternative, teaching contracts are issued for two, three, five, and seven year durations. In every case the decision is based on demonstrated competence, evaluations by colleagues, students, and others who have had the opportunity for frequent contact with the faculty member.

"Those institutions that have begun to experiment in developing alternatives to tenure have found reasonable success in implementing these new approaches within their institutions," said Vaccaro.
