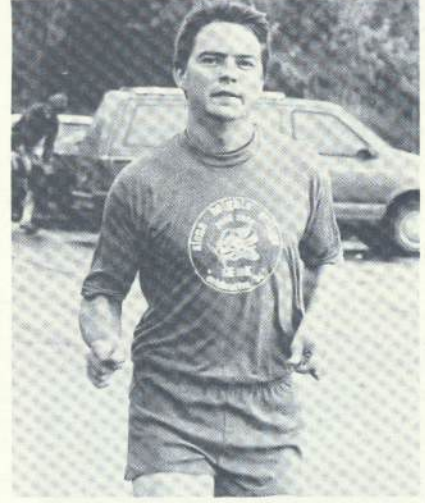

Alumni Weekend — “Celebration ’84”

The theme for last year's Alumni Weekend was "Celebration '84." The Siena Heights campus came alive with a flurry of activities for alumni, friends, students, and staff.

On Friday evening "Celebration '84" was kicked off when alumni and students gathered for a party in Ledwidge Ballroom. On Saturday a 10K Road Race, a 5K Walk/Run, and One Mile Fun Run started the day. That afternoon's events included the alumni buffet luncheon, two educational workshops, a liturgical celebration and the President's Reception. The Alumni Banquet and Las Vegas Night were held Saturday night.

10K, 5K Races, Fun Run

Last year Alumni Weekend's Race format added a 5 kilometer Walk/Run to the 10 kilometer race and the one mile fun run.

The 5K Walk/Run was a welcome addition to the Alumni race format because runners who had not trained for a distance event, such as a 10K, could participate. Many participants ran the 5K while others walked. Overall the addition of the 5K Walk/Run was a success and will be continued next year.

The 10K Road Race, which measures out to 6.2 miles, attracted nearly 50 runners including alumni, students, staff and area residents. Mike Palmer, a Siena freshman from Marshall, Michigan, was the men's overall winner with a time of 36:27. Palmer topped 1983 winner Jim Hood. First to finish among the women was Terry Mahr with a time of 42:03.

The Siena Heights Alumni Weekend race format is designed so that everyone, regardless of his physical condition, can participate.

Alumni Banquet

Saturday night's highlights also featured the alumni banquet, where a trio of former students were honored.

Honored at the banquet were Eileen Rice, O.P., Jeanne Olivier Riesterer, and Lawrence Richardson.

Eileen Rice, O.P., '68, assistant professor of education and director of teacher education at Siena, was chosen to receive the alumni association's Outstanding Alumni Award for 1984. The award is presented on the basis of service to Siena, professional achievements, Christian awareness and leadership. Sr. Eileen was selected because of the quality of her service to the college and the field of education, and her dedication in preparing new teachers.

In making the presentation Sharon Weber, O.P., associate professor of chemistry, praised the award recipient, stating "when Eileen teaches teachers, or talks with groups of people, she is planting seeds that will help us, as a society, develop skills that will bring us closer to a better society, and to social justice."



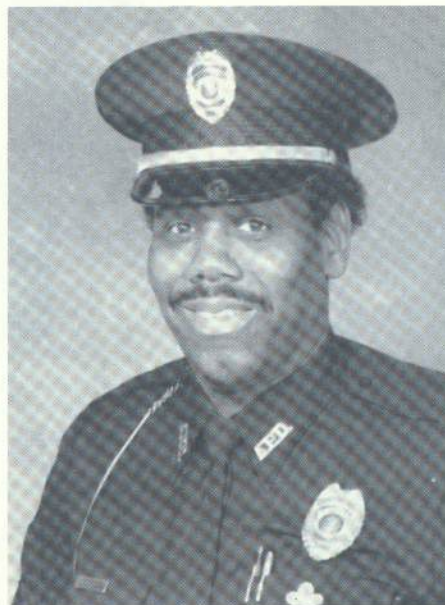
Sr. Eileen was also presented a special tribute by the state of Michigan. The tribute was signed by State Representative Tim Walberg and State Senator Norm Shinkle.

Jeanne Olivier Riesterer, '47, mayor of Roseville, Michigan, was awarded the 1984 St. Dominic Award. This award recognizes commitment to Christian education and public service. The award is named for the 12th century Spanish nobleman who founded the Dominican Religious Order.



Mayor Riesterer, the first woman mayor of Roseville, has served on that city's economic development commission and is involved in numerous activities in Sacred Heart parish. She is the mother of 11 children.

Lawrence Richardson, '76, youth officer for the Adrian Police Department, was selected to receive the Young Alumnus Award for 1984. The Young Alumnus Award is presented to a person who has graduated within the last ten years and has made significant contributions to his community.



Officer Richardson assisted with the start of the Criminal Justice program at Siena. After meeting with the Board of Trustees, former President Hugh Thompson, and other administrators, Officer Richardson persuaded them that a Criminal Justice program would be a success. Officer Richardson felt that police personnel needed a higher education degree to be recognized as professionals. He was also cited for his continued involvement in the training of Siena students in the Criminal Justice program.

Educational Workshops

Two educational workshops, "Whole Person Wellness," and "Mnemonics: Memory Devices," were also part of Alumni Weekend.

Dr. Miriam Stimson, director of graduate studies, conducted the "Wellness" workshop where participants were instructed on healthful intelligent nutrition. Dr. Stimson emphasized that people should evaluate their choices made in eating. The workshop contained a question and answer session which brought out two important facts about wellness. That reducing salt and sugar and increasing carbohydrates, especially fruits and vegetables, are vitally important in achieving whole person wellness.

Tim Husband, assistant professor of mathematics, conducted the "Memory" workshop and demonstrated a few devices or "schemes" to improve memory. Husband's presentation featured a "peg system," in which a "peg" is something you already know and if you have something you want to memorize, you attach it to the "peg." Husband also discussed the "link method" of memorization where topics are linked together to facilitate the memory process.

Siena Welcomes New Faculty

Five new full-time faculty members were appointed at Siena Heights for the 1984-85 academic year. The new faculty include G. J. "Jack" Bologna, David Stephen Calonne, Christine Reising, Mark M. Schersten, and Susan Conley Weeks.

Jack Bologna, whose career includes employment in public accounting, banking, government, and management consulting, was named assistant professor of management. He holds degrees in accounting from the Detroit Institute of Technology, and law from the University of Detroit.



Bologna has lectured on a variety of management topics and has supervised the installation of new management systems for banks, newspapers, and school districts. He is the author of more than 40 technical articles and 6 books on a variety of business and management topics.

Bologna teaches classes at Siena Heights and at the college's degree completion programs in Sylvania, Ohio, and Benton Harbor, Michigan.

He replaced John Huonker who accepted a new position at Cal State in San Bernardino, California.

David Stephen Calonne was named assistant professor of English. Calonne comes to Siena from The University of Texas at Austin where he received his doctorate in English. He received his bachelor's degree in classics from the University of California at Los Angeles.



In addition to teaching English, he is the faculty advisor to "Spectra," the student newspaper.

Calonne specializes in twentieth-century American and British literature. In 1983 his book "William Saroyan: My Real Work Is Being" was published by the University of North Carolina Press.

He replaced James McDonald who accepted a position at Milliken University in Decatur, Illinois.

Christine Reising of Utica, Michigan, was named assistant professor of art. She received her bachelor of science degree from Indiana State University and a master of fine arts degree from the University of Windsor.

Reising has a varied professional background which includes teaching art instruc-



tors, serving on the staff of an Oakland University summer arts camp, and giving demonstrations and lectures at Detroit's Art House.

Reising's art has been displayed at many exhibits including the 1984 Four Fold

Exhibit at the LaBel Gallery in Windsor, the 1983 Southfield Arts Council, Southfield, Michigan, the Ohio Arts Festival Invitational in Evansville, Indiana, and at the Art Venture Exhibit in Toronto.

Reising comes to Siena from the Paint Creek Center for the Arts in Rochester, Michigan, where she was program coordinator.

Mark M. Schersten, formerly of Marquette University in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, was named assistant professor of philosophy.



Schersten graduated from Augustana College in Rock Island, Illinois, with a bachelor of arts degree in philosophy and psychology and earned his master's

degree at Claremont Graduate School. He earned his doctorate at Marquette.

Susan Conley Weeks, who formerly was acting director of field education at the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana, joined the Siena Heights faculty as assistant professor of religious studies.

Prior to her work at Notre Dame she was director of campus ministry at Chicago State University where she also taught introductory courses in scripture, theology, and social justice.

A 1967 graduate of Siena Heights, Weeks participated in retreats and leadership workshops for the Chicago Archdiocese. She has taught at the grade school and high school levels.

Weeks earned a master of divinity from Catholic University in Washington, D.C., and a doctor of ministry from Aquinas Institute of Theology in St. Louis, Missouri.

Weeks won the outstanding service award in 1984 from the Archdiocese of Chicago and the Exemplary Service Award from Chicago State University the same year.

Elected were: Natalia Koselka, chairperson; Richard W. Keeley, vice-chairperson; Margaret Page, O.P., secretary; and Jerome A. Bohland was re-elected to a second term as treasurer.

Natalia Koselka, a judge in the Second District Court in Adrian, has been a board member since 1976 and has been vice-chairperson of the board since 1980. Judge Koselka is a member of the Executive Committee and the Legal Committee, and has previously served on the Student Life

and Academic Affairs Committees. She is the wife of attorney Harvey Koselka and the mother of five children.

Richard W. Keeley, president of Buckeye Products Corporation, Adrian, is a member of the Executive Committee and the College Relations Committee. He has been a trustee since 1979. He previously chaired the Committee on Trustees and served as a member of the Investment and Academic Affairs Committees. He and his wife, Denise, have eight children and reside in Adrian.

NEW LABORATORY

GRADUATE STUDIES NEWS

In November Siena Heights College opened the Sage Counseling Laboratory that assists in the training of graduate students in the addiction counseling program.

Initiated in January of 1984, the master's degree program in addiction counseling prepares master's level counselors with the understanding and skills that enable them to effectively deal with persons who have problems with addiction.

The new lab is a state-of-the-art facility that includes special rooms for family counseling and individual meetings. The laboratory also utilizes video taping equipment that allows viewing of students in performance situations. The large group

laboratory and individual counseling rooms, together with the video equipment, are an effective means for students to see immediately their body language and to modify behavior.

Graduate students working in the lab administer psychological tests and interpret the results under supervision of professional counselors.

According to Dr. Miriam Stimson, O.P., director of graduate studies at Siena, the addition of the counseling lab adds a strong practical component to an already strong theory base in addiction counseling and helps train students "with all the qualities of a good counselor."

Sr. Ann Thomas Griffin was recently named acting director of counselor education at Siena Heights College, filling a vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. Robert P. Brady.

Griffin graduated from Siena Heights with a bachelor's degree and went on to earn master's degrees at both the University of Michigan and Providence College and a doctoral degree in education at Wayne State University.

She continued postdoctoral studies at Florida State University where she was a faculty member in health, rehabilitation, and counseling. She also taught at Appalachian University and at Barry University.

Campus Briefs

Family Day and Open House

Now is the time to reserve Saturday, September 28, 1985, for Siena's next Family Day and Open House.

Ann Hughes, director of alumni and parent relations, is planning to make this year's event even bigger and better than last fall's which was attended by more than 200 people.

All had a good time, the director recalls, from an early brunch for students, their families and Siena faculty members, to a reception in Sage Union prior to the closing liturgy.

Other highlights included tours, an open house at the Admissions Office and a victorious afternoon soccer match.

About next year, Hughes will only say at this early date, that Family Day '85 will be something you shouldn't miss.

Parish Grant Program

Siena Heights College's Parish Grant Program awarded a total of \$81,600 to 183 students for the 1984-85 academic year.

Members of Catholic parishes may apply for Parish Grants, which range from \$300 for in-state students to \$700 for out-of-state students. There are a limited number of these grants per parish. According to Bill Marshall, assistant director of financial aid and admissions, "the parish grant is Siena's way of continuing our strong Catholic heritage." Marshall added, "parish grants also try to assist deserving Catholic families who have given so much to the church both monetarily and intangibly."

The Parish Grant Program awards yearly renewable grants based on financial need.

OXFAM/CROP

Siena Heights and the Dominican Community gave its support to CROP and OXFAM last fall with total contributions to both exceeding \$1,000. The two projects help feed undernourished people, both at home and throughout the world.

North Central Accreditation

In August The Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools voted to continue accreditation of Siena Heights College.

"We are pleased by the action of the Commission," Sister Cathleen Real, president of the college, said. "Periodic evaluation by one's peers is important in a college's continuing efforts to ensure quality education for its students."

Following a comprehensive self-study submitted by the college, a North Central evaluation team visited Siena in April, 1984. The visiting team conducted an examination of the college by reviewing college documents and by extensive conversations and interviews with faculty, administrators, students, and trustees.

Subsequent to the evaluation team's visit the Commission voted to continue accreditation of Siena. The Commission's action was based on the recommendation of the evaluation team.

The North Central Association is the regional accrediting agency for institutions of higher education in the Midwest. Siena's previous comprehensive review for accreditation was in 1975.

Siena's self study and the evaluation team's report, which outlined the college's strengths and concerns, will serve as a basis for the college's long-range planning. A task force has been formed to review the North Central report and to recommend ways to implement its suggestions.

As the first part of its work, the task force has recommended those areas of concern which should receive priority attention.

1984-85 Enrollment Up

The 1984-85 enrollment at Siena's Adrian campus has increased nearly 5 percent over 1983-84. Total enrollment for the first semester of 1984-85 at Siena's main campus is 1,157 students as compared with 1,107 for the first semester 1983-84. In addition to the enrollment on Siena's Adrian campus, approximately 350 students are attending classes at the college's off-campus sites in Southfield and Benton Harbor, Michigan, and Sylvania, Ohio. Nearly 1,500 students are enrolled at Siena's main campus and its extension campuses.

Annual Fund Message

If I made a gift to Siena Heights in April, why am I asked for another in October?

Because Siena's fiscal year runs from July 1 to June 30. The Annual Fund year corresponds to the fiscal year. Thus a gift made in April 1984 is for 1983-84. A gift made in response to the October 1984 mailing is for 1984-85.

Once you make a gift to Siena you are not asked again within the fiscal year. If you respond to the October mailing, you will not be asked in December nor called at phonothon in March. If you respond to the December mailing, you will not be called at phonothon. The college's goal is to receive one gift from each alum each year.

Why does Siena seek gifts from alumni? Because, as with any non-profit organization whose fees do not cover the cost of operations, the college must look to other sources to make up the difference between tuition income and expenditures. Your gift to Siena helps make up the difference. Your gift to Siena helps to pay for library books, faculty salaries, and student financial aid. Most important, your gift to Siena helps to make possible for today's students what others made possible for you.

State-of-the-College Address

"Our two main issues," Dr. Cathleen Real, CHM, Siena Heights College President, told faculty and staff at a state-of-the-college address opening the academic year, "are the common understanding of our mission and how to give students a strong liberal arts education while preparing them for a career."

Sister Cathleen, who became the college's sixth president in July, said that the state-of-the-college address allows faculty and staff to meet and reflect on values at Siena while planning for the academic year.

Speaking of the five areas that report directly to her: academics, student life, admissions, development, and finance, Real said, "These five areas reflect a certain

philosophy of education. Siena exists for the education of students with academic programs being the heart of the institution. Other areas of the college support this mission."

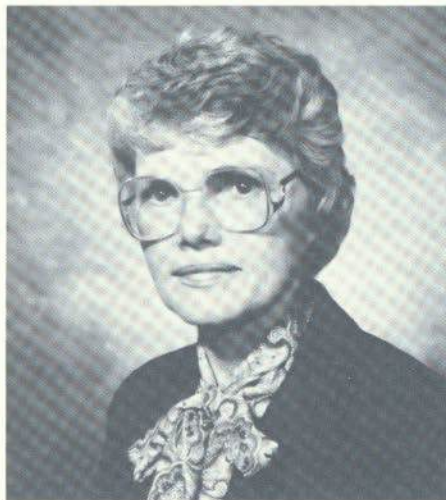
Sister Cathleen reported that Siena has received continued accreditation from the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. She congratulated the faculty and staff members for a job well done and announced the formation of a task force to review the North Central report and to recommend ways of implementing its suggestions.

The first problem that faced her was one many college presidents would envy, Real said; with dormitories filled to capacity, how can the college house additional students?

The new president praised the results of Siena's completed Commitment to Excellence program which exceeded its \$6.5 million goal in gifts and pledges. Sister Cathleen indicated that she would be actively and extensively involved in fund raising for Siena.

Noting the reasonably stable financial condition of the college, Real said, "The difficult task is to evaluate requests and to use resources in the best way possible for growth and development of the college. However, innovative and creative approaches to the scarcity of money often lead to effective solutions."

In concluding her remarks, Sister Cathleen said she hopes that "we challenge one another to live up to our potential in our work at Siena and at the same time contribute to our own enjoyment of our jobs."

"Siena Alumni Have An Important Role"

Dear Alumni,

It is a unique experience to find myself writing an article for Reflections. Also unique are the circumstances which have led me to become actively involved with the Alumni Association. Those who have known me from my student days, as a clay incrusting potter who hibernated mostly in the art studio probably know what I mean. Siena Soccer Scores Success

Soccer soared in popularity last fall at Siena Heights with the Saints booting their way to a successful 11-4-4 season.

1984 was only the second year that soccer was a varsity sport at Siena.

Soccer coach Doug Mello had nothing but praise for his team after they finished runners-up in the District 23 NAIA championships.

"We were young (80 percent freshmen) but we showed a lot of improvement and should play even better during the coming indoor season," declared Mello, going out on a limb to predict national ranking for the Saints in '85.

Siena ranked as high as 3rd this fall in the NAIA Midwest and 8th in the NCAA Mid-East regional ratings.

Looking back, Mello recalls numerous individual performances including Academic and NAIA All-American goalkeeper Dave Sagaert's five shutouts. Sagaert, the team's only senior, was named All-District along with captain Frank Sellors, a sophomore from Centerline, freshmen Wayne Evans from Bellevue, Nebraska, and Lewis Walterhouse of Flint.

Two other outstanding freshmen players were Keith Strange from North Olmstead, Ohio, and Frank Vitale from San Jose, California.

Cross Country

During the past fall season Siena Heights continued its climb toward prominence in both men's and women's cross country.

Wade Perry, a junior from Hartford, Mich., finished 12th out of 400 top distance runners in the NAIA Championships. Perry was named the team's most valuable runner. He finished first in the sixth annual Siena Heights Invitational with a record time of 24:50 for the five-mile course at Adrian's Heritage Park.

Siena's John Detro finished second at the Siena Invitational with a time of 25:43. Detro came in 62nd in the NAIA Championships. Don Fiero, a three-time All-District 23 nominee, was named most improved runner.

The Siena Heights women's cross country team showed sharp improvement under new coach Don Kleinow. Junior Alisa Garcia went to nationals for the second time placing 60th. Donna Benoit was named most improved runner.

Lots of Spike In Volleyball

Siena Heights women put the spike back into volleyball this past fall with a 22-20 season record and a fine showing in the district tournament.

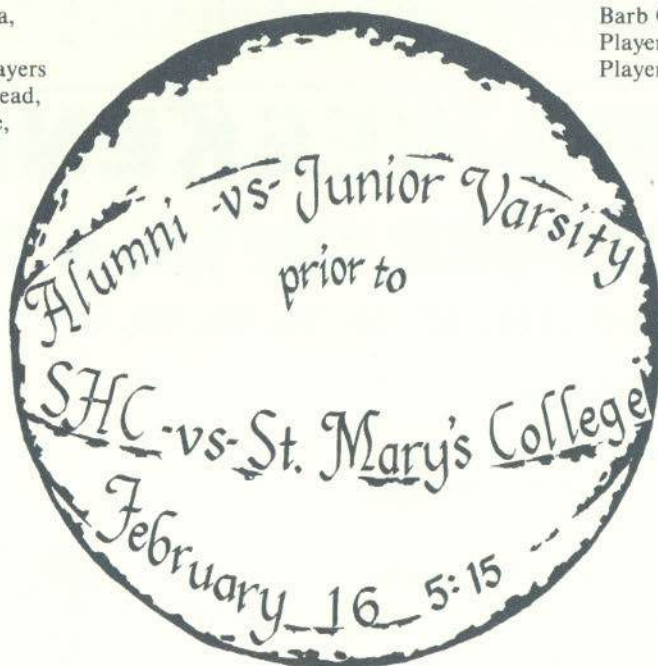
"Playing in the districts was one of our goals this year," said coach Kathi Frank who praised the Siena team for bouncing back after a 1-25 record in 1983.

She recalled how the Saints started off on the right foot this fall by defeating Alma College and chalking up nine straight wins during one stretch.

"We were very committed," Frank explained. "Everybody played extremely well. We were hitting well, our serves were strong and our timing started to click. Everything seemed to fall into place."

Led by All District players Mia Brantley and Leslie Stange, the Saints rolled on to better things. Brantley, a sophomore, led the squad with 161 blocks and a fine attack percentage of .201. Senior Leslie Stange was the Siena leader in serves received and digs.

At the traditional Fall Sports Banquet Barb Gorton was named Most Valuable Player and Kim Lyons Most Improved Player.
