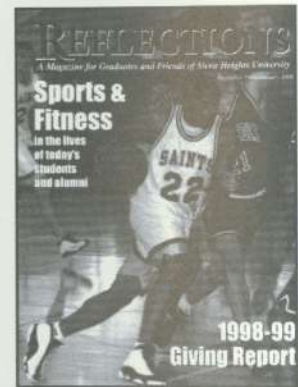

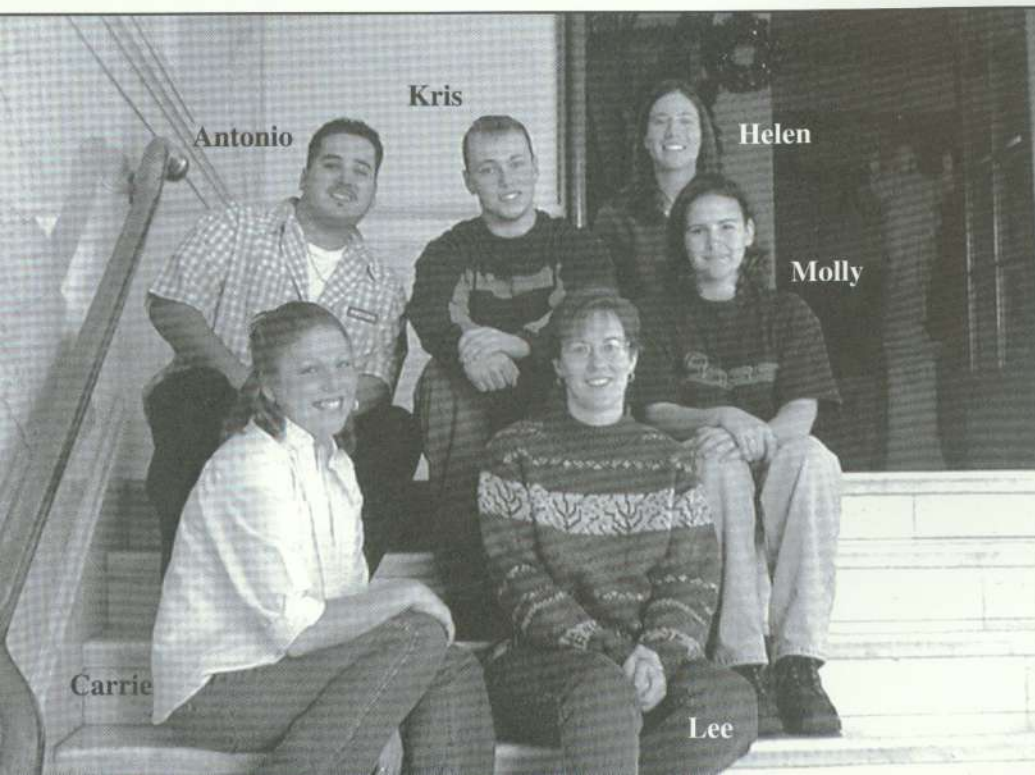

Thinking about *Fitness*

Fitness, the theme for this edition of *Reflections*, is an appropriate emphasis for Siena Heights.

Health and fitness are important topics, not just during the growth and development of our traditional age students, but for all of us. Our competitive athletic programs certainly enhance the physical and mental skills of our student athletes. Their relationships with an extraordinarily dedicated cadre of coaches likewise prepare students for the challenges to be faced in careers, communities and families. Sports are a substantial thread in the fabric of our society and our Adrian campus. It is fitting to praise the dedication and effort of our athletes, teams and coaches throughout the decades.

In a broader context, being fit, and having the right fit, are integral to the long term success of individual students and the university itself. Our admissions staff and academic advisors in Adrian and at our degree completion centers are constantly assessing and advising students and parents about fit. Each university has a distinctive culture and character; our goal is to match prospective students with the Siena culture and spirit, finding the fit that leads to student success. Our approach is working. This fall we experienced a 12% increase in freshman enrollment; and applications for Fall 2000 are more than double what they were at this time last year.

Recent actions by the United States Catholic Bishops were also about fit. The Bishops approved the adoption of a set of implementation norms which follow the Apostolic Constitution *Ex corde Ecclesiae*, written by Pope John Paul II in 1990. Essentially, the document outlines the expectations of the Church for those colleges and universities that call themselves Catholic. I believe we have a good fit as a Catholic university, founded and sponsored by the Adrian Dominican Sisters. There will be more written about *Ex corde* in the months ahead, pending approval of the action of the American bishops by the Vatican.

Finally, some comments about the fitness of the University itself. Although we are tuition dependent, our financial fitness continues to improve. Significant improvements to the salaries of our faculty and staff during the past two years align our compensation and benefits with median salaries of peer institutions. Technology improvements continue as we try to fit more wires, cables and antennae into and around the campus to provide the tools for a better teaching and learning environment. We're getting better, every day, and we're ready for Y2K!

New Year's resolutions often entail a personal promise to improve our health and fitness. I'm resolved to keep our attention focused on our mission and strategic directions. Strengthening our financial health is one of those goals and I'm grateful to each of you who have made a contribution to our annual fund, endowment or special projects. Please join me in this resolve as the trustees and I launch *The Campaign for Siena Heights University*. You will hear more about the priorities for the campaign in the months ahead. We have a healthy University — and with your continued support we will raise the bar even higher.

Honors and Achievements

- **Pat Schnapp, RSM**, English, had a poem published in the Spring 1999 issue of *Christianity and Literature*. The poem is titled "Private Flock."
- **Simone Yehuda**, English, was one of five individuals inducted recently into the Circle of Scholars at The Union Institute in Cincinnati. The Circle of Scholars is among the highest academic honors bestowed by The Union Institute on graduate learners. The award celebration on September 24 included research presentations by each of the Circle of Scholars inductees.



- **John Wittersheim**, art, **Jamie Goode '87**, art, and **Melissa Durbin Growden '90**, admissions, along with local Siena Heights art alumni and other area artists, are developing a public art project to mark the millennium while celebrating and preserving local history. Organized by the Lenawee Council for the Visual Arts, the volunteers are creating a multi-part sculpture that highlights the historical events, people and heritage of Lenawee County. Seven eight-foot-tall bronze columns will commemorate achievements in education, agriculture, government, industry, transportation, religion and the military. Each column will have 10 four-sided strata, or story boards, presenting chapters in county history. The monument is scheduled for unveiling on New Year's Eve in Adrian's Comstock Park and will tour the county for the next year. The sculpture then will be formally dedicated in its permanent location (likely to be Comstock Park) on December 31, 2000. Ken Thompson '77, owner of Flatlanders Sculpture Supply, has played a leadership role in the project. Other alumni participants include Denise Keeley '88, Pam Bacon '88 and others.

The Music of Chopin, the Technology of the 90s

Pianist Magdalena Ezoe, OP '55, a member of the Siena Heights music faculty since the early 1970s, gave a "Non-Stop Piano Concert" of Chopin's music on October 17, in honor of the 150th anniversary of the composer's death in Paris, Oct. 17, 1849. The recital was enthusiastically received on the Adrian campus — and was recorded for the benefit of those who were not in the Francoeur Theatre audience that day. Sister Magdalena describes listening to the live recording of her performance as "a very humbling experience." Other listeners call it delightful! The compact disc (CD) of "Sister Mag's" concert, featuring 20 piano compositions by Fryderyk Chopin (1810-1849), is available to alumni and friends interested in supporting the Siena Heights music department's keyboard lab and recording studio. To receive a copy of the "150th Anniversary Recital" CD,

send your donation of at least \$20 (make checks out to Siena Heights University, memo: music department) to Sister Magdalena or Mike Lorenz in the music department.

Magdalena, a native of Japan who came to the United States in 1951, becoming an Adrian Dominican Sister in 1952, also is well-known for her own compositions, several of which are about to be published by Alliance Publications, Inc. in Wisconsin. The new publications include: "Clothe Me with Yourself, Eternal Truth," textual adaptations of Dialogue of St. Catherine of Siena by Nadine Foley, OP '45, professor of religious studies at Siena Heights; and "Psalm 13, I praise you, for I am wonderfully made." Both pieces were composed for the liturgical services held at Lumen Chapel on the Adrian campus. ■



A New Degree for the Musically Inclined

The Trustees in October approved adding the Bachelor of Music Education to the list of undergraduate degrees offered by Siena Heights. The decision follows a curriculum revision of Siena's music education major, which prepares students to teach K-12 instrumental and vocal music. The Bachelor of Music Education will give Siena's music program more visibility among prospective students and high school counselors. Other baccalaureate degrees offered at Siena Heights are: Bachelor of Arts (B.A.), Bachelor of Science (B.S.), Bachelor of Fine Arts (B.F.A.), Bachelor of Applied Science (B.A.S.), and (pending final accreditation) Bachelor of Social Work (B.S.W.).

Academics Online

Two new developments put Siena Heights on the front lines of educational technology. First, students on the Adrian campus now are able to register for classes on the web, avoiding long lines at the registrar's office. Students (who formerly camped out in the hallway outside the registrar's office in order to register early for classes) welcomed the change. "It's nice to see Siena using the latest technology," said Doreen Murphy '00.

The University also has contracted with the eCollege corporation to offer five on-line courses from the Metropolitan Detroit Program. Siena faculty are completely re-

sponsible for course development and content, while eCollege manages the technical delivery. Several classes already have on-line content; for example, students can access schedules and assignments and share discussions through the web. The new classes take the technology even further; they begin and end with in-person class meetings but rely on web-based interaction for all other course delivery. Classes in management principles, technology management and an upperclass seminar will debut on the web for Metro Detroit's March-April term. Courses in history and philosophy are scheduled to follow. ■

A Grand Collaboration

Siena Heights recently donated a house in Adrian to the Lenawee County chapter of Habitat for Humanity. The house, formerly located on University-owned property on Addison Street, was moved to a site on Elm Street

donated for the purpose by St. Joseph Catholic Church. Through Habitat for Humanity, someone in need will become the new owner of the house. "This unique situation allowed all three organizations to advance our respective missions in service to

the others," said Siena Heights President Rick Artman. The project shows "that many dimensions of our community are committed to the east side of Adrian," said Father Jim Lothamer. The vacated Addison Street property will become a parking area for Siena's new softball field. ■

Sleeping out for the homeless

As temperatures dropped in September, members of the Phi Sigma Sigma sorority on Siena's Adrian campus learned just how

The Little College that Could!

From modest beginnings, Siena Heights builds a powerful athletics program

Tiny college starts sports noted the headline of the 1972 Detroit News article heralding the decision by Siena Heights College to begin an intercollegiate athletics program.

That sports writer probably never dreamed that 25-plus years later, "tiny" Siena Heights would consistently take top honors in its conference and boast approximately 250 student athletes.

Today, the SHU athletics program is a force to be reckoned with in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) and the Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference (WHAC). SHU teams regularly participate in NAIA national championships and WHAC regional tournaments. The Siena Heights University Athletic Hall of Fame premiered this fall, honoring its inaugural class of athletes and coaches.

Athletic activities were not new at Siena in 1972, however. A variety of sports were played intramurally and recreationally almost from the beginning.

The Early Years

As early as the 1920s, administrators of what was then St. Joseph College emphasized the importance of fitness as part of the education of the "whole" person, incorporating the physical as well as the mental, spiritual and psychological realms. "Physical training" classes were a requirement for lay students. Recreation periods, which included time for sports activities, were a scheduled part of the students' day.

By the 1940s, an active sports and fitness program had developed, due in part to the considerable influence of Ann Joachim, O.P. "Sister Ann coached the basketball team," Sister Helen Duggan, OP '41 recalled. "I've seen a picture of her with

her habit tied up, showing students how to shoot baskets." Before she entered the Congregation, Ann Joachim was a lawyer, a pilot, and a great sportswoman.

Leslie Hartway, O.P. '45 concurred: "Sister Ann could shoot baskets from the middle of the court better than the kids."

The basketball team played intramural games as well as an occasional match against St. Joseph's Academy, area high school teams or a girls' team from a community college. Other sports also were offered as part of the physical education program. The 1946-47 college catalog featured a long list of available activities including volleyball, tennis, baseball, soccer, archery, badminton, creative dance, horseback riding and hiking.

Walsh Hall, now known as Sage Student Union, housed the gymnasium in the space

now occupied by the SHU Bookstore. The 1946-47 course catalog describes the facility as "well-equipped [with] shower baths, locker rooms and other facilities necessary to a well-organized athletic program."

"The gym uniforms we wore were very similar to those baggy shorts that the professional basketball players wear now, only ours were pleated and they went below the knee," recalled Ann Bakeman Tompert '38. "They were comfortable really, very loose. I guess the more things change, the more they stay the same!"

Transitional Years

The 1960s brought sweeping changes to the Siena campus. Under the forward-looking guidance of Sister M. Petronilla Francoeur, O.P., Siena Heights president from 1965 to 1969, many aspects of the college were re-evaluated. Academic programs were expanded to include new majors in business and human services. Admissions policies were amended to allow the enrollment of male students. Laypeople were named to the Board of Trustees. More classes were taught by lay faculty.

Donna Shindorf, a physical education instructor, began teaching at Siena in the early 1960s. "Athletics could be and should be a vital part of every college women's program," Shindorf said in a 1964 article in *The Heights*. She went on to say that athletics serves as "a basis for social growth and proper outlet of emotions," providing balance to the academic programs.

The decision to begin admitting full-time male students in 1968 was a turning point in Siena's history, exemplifying Sister Petronilla's vision of the college as "an institution engaged in self-renewal." 1968 would also prove to be a turning point in the history of athletics at Siena, since the presence of male students on campus soon led to the establishment of a formal sports program.

"Tiny College Starts Sports"

The decision to implement an intercollegiate athletic program was announced in June 1972. Siena Heights had been open to men for about four years at that time but male enrollment lagged behind expectations. The administration hoped athletics would provide an additional enticement.

Dr. Hugh Thompson, Siena president from 1971 to '77, brought a coaching background to the job which proved an asset as the college pieced together a sports program. Sam Baughey '72 was tapped to aid

in the process, serving as interim athletic director until the college hired Harvey Jackson in 1973.

"Dr. Thompson talked to me about things because I was one of the few men on campus. He and I sat down and talked about the possibility of developing an athletics program," Baughey said.

"I contacted a couple different universities about their programs, places like Wayne State University, University of Toledo. As things went along, the Sisters were involved.

"We decided football was out of the question because of the financial investment we'd have to make up front. So we selected two sports to start with, baseball and golf," Baughey said. "I coached the golf team, which wasn't much. It was hard finding five guys on campus who played golf."

Siena's fledgling baseball team played its first official game on April 3, 1973 against Monroe County Community College. All home games were played at Riverside Park in Adrian.

"I would call and talk to other teams' athletic directors and explain our situation, knowing that we really weren't competing," Baughey recalled. "We weren't a real threat; we just needed the competition. We played against Wayne State, the University of Toledo once in a while, mostly bigger institutions. Most of them were very gracious in allowing us to play them."

The baseball team at first was known as the Cannonballers, because of an anecdote from the college's past: Sister Ann Joachim, O.P., had received national publicity in her campaign to prevent the Wabash Cannonball, which ran through Adrian en route to St. Louis, from being taken out of railway service. By 1975, the team had become the Saints.

"We had a little contest on campus to try and think of a name. The Saints was the obvious choice. It kind of went with everything, and the Sisters liked it," Baughey recalled.

Harvey Jackson took over as athletic director in

July 1973, immediately signing up the college as a member of the NAIA. Since the NAIA at that time did not sponsor women's athletics, the college enrolled its women in the South West Athletic Conference (SWAC). Jackson announced Siena's participation in men's cross country, wrestling, baseball and golf, and women's tennis, basketball and bowling.

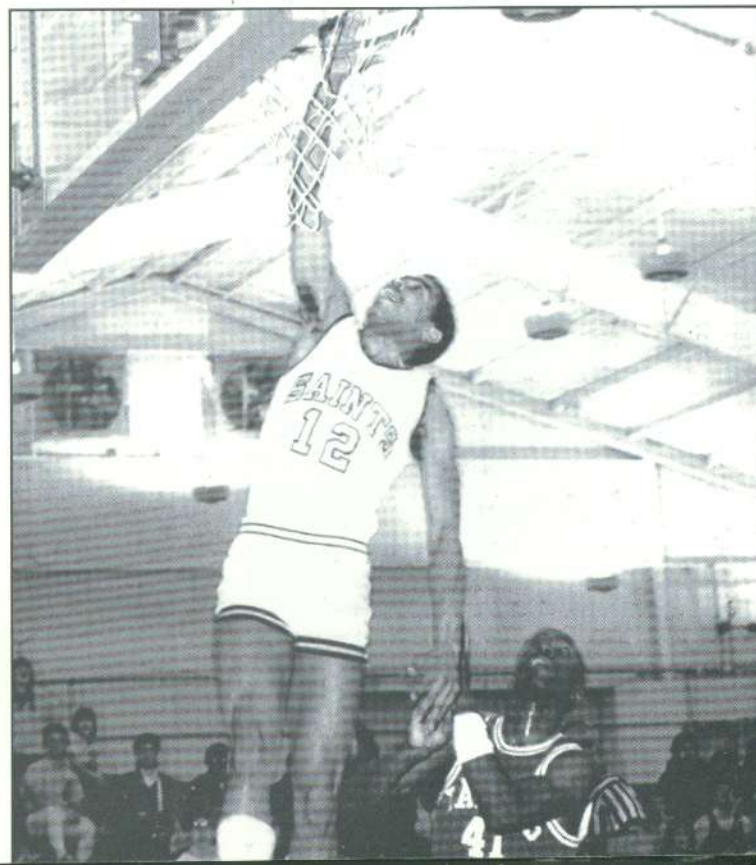
A baseball diamond, Zollar Field, was constructed and dedicated in September 1973, followed by outdoor tennis courts in the spring of 1974.

Siena's "little" athletics program was off to a good start.

The Rise of Intercollegiate Athletics

"I remember when we had six or seven sports and approximately 90 student athletes. Now we have 14 sports and 250 student athletes," reflected Fred Smith, today's Siena Heights athletic director and men's basketball coach.

"The role of the athletics program, initially, was to bring males into this institution, and it really succeeded," said Smith. "It was a great opportunity for the student athlete. At that time, we'd take anybody who wanted to play."





The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics

The NAIA administers competitive programs leading to 23 national championships in 13 sports for men and women. The NAIA is comprised of about 370 member colleges and universities, representing about 33 percent of all American collegiate athletic programs. Siena Heights joined the NAIA in 1973 and competes in Division II. Student athletes are required to maintain an acceptable grade point average while making progress toward a degree. The All-America Scholar-Athlete program recognizes student athletes with a GPA of 3.5 or better on a 4.0 scale. The Saints have finished in the top 50, among all schools in the NAIA, in each of the four years of the association's Sears Directors' Cup Competition.

The Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference

The WHAC, formed in 1992 and affiliated with the NAIA, is composed of private colleges and universities in Michigan and Indiana. Current members include Aquinas, Concordia, Cornerstone, Indiana Tech, Madonna, Siena Heights, Spring Arbor and Tri-State. The annual WHAC All-Sports Championship is based on the total points earned in men's and women's team competition and denotes conference excellence; Siena Heights won the All-Sports Championship in 1994-95, 1995-96 and 1996-97.

Intercollegiate Athletics at Siena Heights University

Our sports include: for women — basketball, cross country, soccer, fastpitch softball, indoor and outdoor track & field, and volleyball; for men — baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, and indoor and outdoor track & field. More than half of the residential students on the Adrian campus participate in intercollegiate athletics.

Intramural Sports

Intramurals and open recreation are offered for both men and women. Activities include basketball, soccer, sand volleyball and softball, among others.

Smith, athletic director since 1983 and a Siena staff member since 1976, recalled the growth of the sports facilities. "The Fieldhouse wasn't even here when I got here. We played our contests in volleyball and basketball at the old Catholic Central High School. Baseball we played at Riverside Park. Now we have a baseball field, a softball field, and a soccer field, although the soccer field is on Motherhouse property."

Siena's athletic program held steady through the 1970s, despite having three different athletic directors between 1973 and 1978. A number of sports were added or dropped during that time, limited by the facilities that were available. The number of student athletes remained about the same.

The construction of the Fieldhouse in 1978, along with the implementation of an athletic service grant program, shifted Siena sports into high gear. The late '70s and early '80s saw the number of male and female student athletes double.

Women's sports played an important part in the athletics program throughout this period. When the SWAC folded, Siena joined the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW).

"Very few of our women's programs participated in the AIAW at the state level, but Sister Mary Alice Murnen '54 had a basketball team in '78-'79 that won its first 23 games of the season," Smith said. Sister Mary Alice coordinated women's athletics and was Siena's first full-time women's coach. The team finished third in the AIAW state tournament with a 27-2 overall record. "It was quite extraordinary," Smith recalled.

When the NAIA began sponsoring women's athletics in 1980, the AIAW essentially went out of business, Smith said. In the NAIA, Siena's women's teams struggled as they faced off against more established programs while men's teams enjoyed greater success, spurred in part by the athletic service grant program and improved sports facilities.

programs," Smith said.

"In the old days, we had to familiarize people at the high schools and community colleges with what Siena was about," he added. "Now we've established a reputation. People know who we are. I've watched that go full circle. It's been very gratifying."

Smith and his coaching staff are deservedly proud of their athletes. The men's basketball team has made an appearance for four years running at the NAIA Division II National Championship Tournament, with the 1996-97 team finishing second overall. Siena sent baseball player Jason Martines to the Arizona Diamondbacks, a professional team, and saw Carl Brown compete in the 1996 U.S. Olympic Track and Field Trials.

"Our school's mission isn't to build a basketball team that goes to the national tournament and wins a national championship—which we came within a lay-up of doing. It's to help students become more competent, purposeful and ethical, to become educated, get jobs and become pillars of our society," Smith emphasized.

"Look at our outstanding students: how many of them have played intercollegiate athletics? A lot of them. But that doesn't make them only athletes. They're students who play. And that's the way we like it."

Win-loss records are important, Smith tells his players, "but what you will remember is the experience. A great example was listening to the student athletes who were inducted into the inaugural Hall of Fame at this year's Alumni Weekend. When they look back, they aren't talking about championships. They're talking about the fun they had, the times they spent together. "That's really why we're in this." ■

Since 1984, the number of student athletes has increased by about 40 percent overall and the number of female athletes has almost doubled, Smith said. Recruiting plays a large role in the increase. We average about 85 freshmen and 15 transfers; that's a hundred kids per year that we help bring to Siena for our sports

A jock I am not. But for the past several weeks I've been going to the "Y" twice a week. Down in the deep end of the pool, wearing a buoyancy belt around my ribs, I walk back and forth in the water for an hour. Sometimes I jog, sometimes I bicycle, and sometimes I march like a wooden soldier, straight-legged and straight-armed. I suspect that I look like a decapitated head moving back and forth.

For years I've been thinking about joining the "Y". But it took a bad accident to get me there. A smashed pelvis and right hip, along with significant nerve damage, drew to a close life as I'd known it. I spent five months in a nursing facility in Fremont, Ohio, mainly looking at ceiling tiles. (If they hold secret messages, I didn't decode them.)

Fortunately, though some body parts were permanently damaged, I wasn't "totaled." With the help of a foot brace and the support of my cane (a Blue Cross Special, not some jazzy number with a foxhead on top), I'm up and teaching again. It's energizing to be immersed once more in the dizzying wit and wisdom of Shakespeare

and—yes—even the perilous pitfalls of dangling participles.

I'm now impaired. But most of me is fine. And if you asked if I were well, I'd say yes.

Being well, I suspect, is partly an attitude. Negatively, it's the quiet refusal to let limitations block the delight of a Rachmaninoff piano concerto on the radio,

or a fall sugar maple vivid as a burning bush, or a savory roast beef supper, or the stimulation and fun of a Jeopardy show, or the seductive magic of a good book.

Positively, it's an arms-wide-open welcoming of the gifts and problems each day brings, a hospitality to life. It's a capacity for eagerness, for gusto, for humor. It's a heightened gratitude for friends and for the quirky variety of our species. It's a desire to continue pushing limits and taking risks, to keep learning and experimenting. It's also the acceptance of pain as a new challenge and the gradual digesting of loss. It's squeezing the juice from experience.

Meanwhile, as I philosophize to myself, I'm jogging across the pool in "slo mo," one eye on the clock. This chlorinated, walled pond is my hermitage, my retreat from phone calls, committee meeting, and advisees with scheduling problems. But it's time to go.

Encouraging Students to Balance Their Lives

Many people think of "wellness" simply as being physically fit, but there is much more to being well, according to members of the Siena Heights wellness team. Athletic trainer Gerry Schlemer, counselor Carol Stuu, nurse Norma Baldwin and others are working together to promote and achieve wellness on the Adrian campus.

Gerry Schlemer describes wellness as a wheel. The center of the wheel is "optimal health" and the spokes are the ways of achieving optimal health. Physical fitness is one of these spokes, but there are also spokes for diet and nutrition as well as mental, emotional and spiritual well being. If one of these spokes is broken, your wheel will not be well-rounded and will throw your life off balance.

Psychological stresses, such as an overload in work, relationship problems or

family conflicts, can throw the wheel off balance. Carol Stuu helps Siena students deal with many of these problems. She encourages students "to take care of themselves physically, emotionally, and spiritually." She tries to help students to deal with life's challenges and develop the right attitude towards life.

Nurse Norma Baldwin believes her role goes beyond helping students get over a cold or the flu. She finds it a challenge "to teach students that balance is a key to their lives, and they need to prioritize what is important in their lives before they are able to balance it." Sleep deprivation, partying and not eating properly are common problems for students, she notes. While treating students' health problems, Norma tries to help students get focused and back on track.

Many students assume that varsity athletes are the ideal models of wellness,

because they are physically fit; but not all athletes are mentally fit, spiritually well, or even eating a healthy diet, wellness team members note. In fact, it can be difficult for athletes to maintain wellness because they have so much to balance. In order to study, sleep, eat and maintain relationships along with practices and games, they need to prioritize. For many students, athletes and non-athletes, prioritizing can be difficult.

Wellness team members all emphasize the need to prioritize your life and balance your priorities. "Take time for yourself. Refill your spirit and soul," advises Norma.

"Keeping things in proportion becomes more important as we age," Gerry adds. "Not only do we need good physical fitness but also a healthy social, spiritual and occupational life." His advice to alumni is the same advice he gives to students: "Find a balance and don't lose sight of it." ■

Ben Braun '81/MA
Berkley, CA

Men's Basketball Coach 1977-85

Currently head basketball coach at the University of California, Braun began his collegiate coaching career at Siena Heights in 1977. Two years later, he led the team to its first winning season. He went on to record seven consecutive winning seasons at Siena before departing for Eastern Michigan U., where in nine years he garnered three Mid-American Conference (MAC) titles, three appearances in the NCAA Tournament, and three MAC Coach-of-the-Year awards. In 1997, Braun was named coach at California, where he led the Bears to the "Sweet 16" and became the first coach ever to be named PAC-10 Coach-of-the-Year in his first season. (Ben was unable to attend the induction).

Lawrence Miller '84
Detroit, MI
Basketball

Lawrence Miller could do it all on the basketball court. Nicknamed "Magic," he was a freshman in '79 when the other "Magic" was leading the Spartans to the NCAA National Championship.



As a junior, he was named to the NAIA All-District #23 Team. As a senior, he was named the Saints' Most Valuable Player and reached the Saints' 1,000 point club. He was the team's Defensive Player-of-the-Year in 1981 and 1983. He has remained active in basketball as a coach at Western International High School in Detroit, while also serving as an attendance agent for the Detroit Public School System. In 1995, the Detroit Public Schools Basketball Coaches Association named him PSL Coach-of-the-Year in the Southwest

Division. He lives in Detroit with his wife, Sandra, and daughter April.

John Detro '85
Fort Benning, GA
Cross Country/Track & Field

One of the top distance runners in Siena Heights track & field history, John Detro was an All-American both on the track and in the classroom. He was a four-time NAIA track & field All-American and three-time All-American Scholar-Athlete for the Saints. A two-time All-American in both the steeplechase and the indoor three-mile event, he was also a member of the first Siena cross country team to compete in the NAIA National Championships. A 1st Lieutenant in the U.S. Army's 75th Ranger Regiment and the 3rd Battalion at Fort Benning, he still competes as a runner. A biology major at Siena Heights, he also has earned an additional degree in Physician Assistant Studies and a master's degree in P.A. Studies in Family Medicine. He and his wife Moraima have three children: Xavicia (17), Jose (15), and Anthony (4).



Martha Hans Palmer '88
Jackson, MI
Cross Country/Track & Field

Former hurdle great Martha Hans Palmer is in a class by herself as the only female athlete in Saints' history to win an NAIA National Championship. As a senior, she won the 60-yard hurdle title with a time of 7.96 at the NAIA Indoor National Championships. She was a four-time NAIA All-American hurdler from 1986-88 and was named to four NAIA All-American



Scholar-Athlete teams. She holds every school record (both indoor and outdoor) in the hurdle events, as well as two fieldhouse records in the 55-meter and 200-meter intermediate hurdle events. She was also the 1988 Business Administration Student of the Year. She has stayed active as an assistant track coach, first at Hillsdale College and for the past three years here at Siena Heights. She and her husband Mike have a daughter Madison (7) and sons Mitchell (4) and Trey (1).

Andrew Crawford '89
Amherst, NY
Soccer

The only men's soccer player to be named to two NAIA All-American teams, Andrew Crawford was a four-time District #23 selection for the Saints. He was also a three-time NAIA All-Region selection. As a freshman, he starred on the Saints' first team to compete at the NAIA National Championship Tournament in 1985. He is the Saints' all-time leading scorer, ranking #1 in career goals (67), assists (29) and total points (163). No other athlete in Siena Heights history has had a more prestigious professional sports career. For the past six years, he has been a top player for the Buffalo Blizzard in the National Professional Soccer League, where he ranks third all-time in goals (173) and fourth in total points (434) in the franchise's history. He and his wife Trish have two children, Ian (6) and Morgan (2).



Abby English Waldbaum '90
Mill Valley, CA
Soccer

Abby English led Siena's first women's soccer team in scoring as a freshman and was

named to the NAIA All-Region Team in 1987. During her next three seasons, she would be captain and lead the nationally-ranked Saints to 56 wins. She was a 1st-team NAIA All-American midfielder in 1988, when the Saints won a school-record 25 games and placed third in their first appearance at the NAIA National Championships. As a senior, she was a 2nd-team NAIA All-American. She ranks #4 all-time in scoring with 104 career points and #3 all-time in assists. A business administration major at Siena, she works in the sports marketing field as race director for the San Francisco Examiner "Bay to Breakers" race, the world's largest footrace. She and her husband Greg have a newborn son, Max. (Abby was unable to attend the induction.)

Shelly Lizyness '93, '96/MA

Monroe, MI
Softball

A three-time NAIA All-District pitcher, Shelly Lizyness posted a 17-6 record with a 0.94 earned run average as a sophomore and was named District #23 "Player-of-the-Year." As a junior, she again was named the District's top player. She had a 25-15 record in '91 and pitched the Saints to a district



championship, a regional title, and their first (and thus far only) appearance in the NAIA Softball World Series. She set a single-season record for wins with 30 victories in the Saints' 34-9 season in '82. She owns virtually every Siena Heights softball career pitching record including wins (77), strikeouts (358), earned run average (1.43), complete games (105), batters faced (2113) and innings pitched (742). Upon graduation, she joined the Saints' coaching staff as a graduate assistant. She now works as a human resource associate for Ford/Visteon.

Men's Basketball Team

NAIA National Tournament 1988-89 Quarterfinalists

The 1988-89 men's basketball team holds the school record for most wins in a season (31). The '89 Saints won the District #23 tournament championship title, which earned Coach Fred Smith's club its first appearance in the NAIA Division I National Championships. As an unseeded team, the Saints upset the #11-seed before falling in the quarterfinals. The Saints were led by All-District forwards William

Clyburn and Mark Merriman. Clyburn was an honorable mention All-American and Merriman was named to the National All-Tournament Team. Others on this legendary team included Carleton "Moon" Johnson, Brian Dettling, Craig Tanis, Bernard Loudermill, James Stafford, Nick Langenderfer, Jemile Green, Lester Dickerson, Steve Moore, Al Harris, Cichon Robinson, and Pat Henry. ■

Strong Preparation for Health Science Careers

Siena Heights students majoring in the sciences on the Adrian campus have achieved a 94% placement rate in professional school among all pre-medicine/pre-veterinary students who applied; and a 100% graduate school placement rate with assistantship for majors who applied.

Pioneering Pediatric Health

Donita Sullivan, M.D., a 1952 Siena Heights graduate, was one of just 11 people chosen this year as Masters in the American College of Rheumatology, the national organization of professionals practicing rheumatology for adults and children. Master status is one of the highest honors the ACR bestows; it is an award "given to members who have set and achieved the highest standards in advancing the art and science of rheumatology." Dr. Sullivan, who was honored at the November ACR Convention

in Boston, spent 37 years on the University of Michigan Medical School faculty where "I had the good fortune to be in the position of being one of the pioneers in the development of the subspecialty of pediatric rheumatology." Now a retired professor emerita, she continues to be a consultant with doctors in training at U-M. "Now I depend on my young trainees to keep me smart," she says modestly.

Siena's Degrees of Health

Siena Heights offers a variety of degree programs for working adults employed in health-related fields. The Bachelor of Applied Science in Allied Health Professions, available at all Siena Heights sites, is a career-oriented degree completion program for professionals in such fields as: registered nursing, diagnostic medical sonography, EEG, nuclear medicine, medical laboratory or radiologic technology, radiation or respiratory therapy, dental hygiene, massage therapy and other related fields. B.A.S. students majoring in allied

health at the Metropolitan Detroit Program also have the opportunity to complete a focused health care management minor. Another recent addition to the University's academic offerings in Metropolitan Detroit is the Master of Arts in Health Care Administration, a graduate degree designed to help individuals in the allied health profession develop and grow as leaders within the complex health care field.

Fieldhouse Expansion Plans

Built in 1978 when the intercollegiate athletic program was just beginning, the Siena Heights Fieldhouse is in need of expansion. A modest addition to the building is part of the University's strategic plan. The addition will include a fitness center large enough to accommodate a comprehensive wellness program, expanded team locker room space, and additional office space, enabling all athletic offices to be in the same building.

Like the U.S. Marines, Crystal Starkey accomplishes more before 7 a.m. than most people do all day.

Instead of starting the day with a cup of coffee, Starkey is up before sunrise for the wake-up call of 10 miles across cold pavement.

Returning from the grueling roadwork, Starkey prepares herself for a full day of classes and more physical training. The 10 miles at the start of the day was for the cross country team. In the afternoon, she becomes a dashing point guard on the basketball team.

The end of athletic practice is not the end of the day for Starkey. After a quick dinner, she heads to the weight room to build her strength. The rest of the evening is spent on homework. She keeps her head on the games *and* on the books, maintaining a 3.4 grade point average. While most people would collapse part way through the day, Starkey has never known any other way. Starkey's ambition is to become like her father and be a marathon runner, something he has completed eight times.

What does that mean? It adds up to Starkey running the standard 26 miles during the cold winter months while remaining a key player on the basketball court. Factor in May graduation plans, and it's clear she has her hands full.

Starkey is also making plans for life after Siena Heights. She hopes to attend

Central Michigan University to pursue a career in exercise science. "My goal is to become a personal trainer with a concentration on diet and weight training," she says.

With what seems like a mountain of work ahead, Starkey smiles and remembers what got her where she is today: strong family support and simple mottos.

"Growing up, my dad always quoted Ben Franklin:

Early to bed, early to rise makes a person healthy, wealthy, and

wise," she says. "I also live by the words: The harder I work, the luckier I get."

Now that Skeels is back home, the Saints are improving their chances at a national championship. Skeels states simply, "The only thing I want to do is play well for my team."

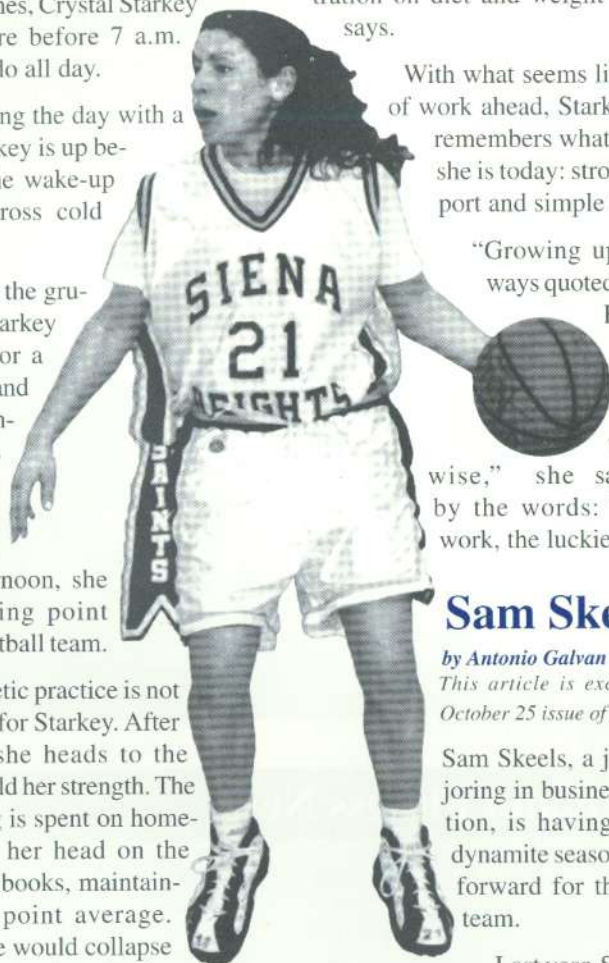
In his spare time, Skeels exemplifies the type of person Siena is proud to have as a student athlete. He dominates the classroom as well as the soccer field.

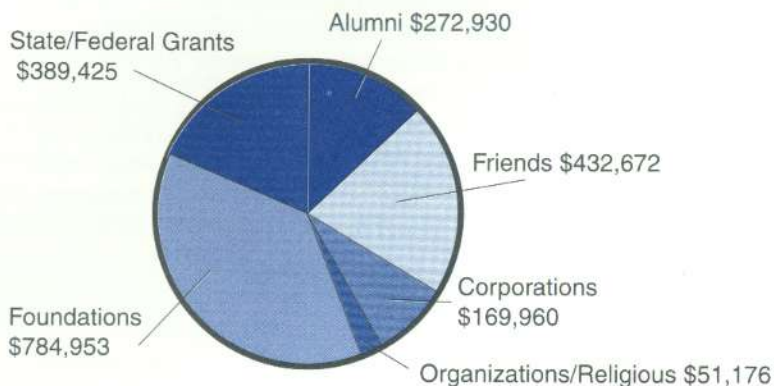

Donors touring Francoeur Theatre before curtain time admired the new carpeting, new lobby furniture and display cases, new lighting and ceiling tiles, new stage draperies, and a light-blocking wall at the entrance to the theatre.

Volunteer Profile: Bob Price

Giving Where it Helps

At first glance, Bob Price seems an unlikely volunteer leader for Siena Heights. He's the grandson of a Methodist minister, son of a University of Michigan grad, a loyal alumnus of Michigan State and an avid Spartans fan. "I bleed green," he says, showing a visitor the MSU insignia built into the wall of his company building.

But look again and this Siena Heights trustee—chairman of the President's Cabinet and the benefactor behind this year's Annual Fund Alumni Challenge—comes into focus as a very logical supporter for the University. The energy and enthusiasm he brings to every task, his concern for people and treating them well, and his modest generosity: all mesh perfectly with the spirit and values of Siena Heights.

President of Primore, Inc. (founded in 1946) and Sedco, a Division of Primore (now in its fourth decade of operation), Bob Price is an established part of the Adrian business community. The companies produce shut-off and relief valves for national and international markets. Almost none of the business is local, but that doesn't stop Bob from supporting numerous local causes, from local high school fund raisers to United Way, the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life, and lots of others.

"You have to give back," he explains. "How else are you going to survive? If you're successful and you're able, you just give money where you think it will do the most good."

Which brings us to Siena Heights University. "Education does a lot of good."

Bob's support for education flows naturally from his concern for people. "The whole thing is people," he says, attributing his own business success largely to the people around him. "You need good products and the right people, and then you treat them well, pay them well, provide good benefits." It's business by the golden rule, he said.

Asked what he likes about Siena Heights, Bob again focuses on people and a caring atmosphere. "Siena has a great president and a great Board," he says. "Nobody sits back. They're always planning how to improve the curriculum, how to make things better for students. People at Siena Heights are really concerned about the students, and the students I've met are very impressive. It's a really fine institution."

And if Bob has his way, it will be even better, thanks to increased support from SHU alumni. After assisting with last year's Trustee Challenge, which brought new and renewed support into the University at the President's Cabinet level (gifts of \$1,000 and up), Bob this year raised the Annual Fund Alumni Challenge. For fiscal year 1999-2000, he's agreed to match - dollar for dollar — new or increased gifts from Siena alumni.

"We need to let all alumni, especially the younger graduates, know that every gift counts, every gift makes a difference. Maybe you can't give \$1,000, but you can give something. I only gave \$25 to MSU when I first got out," he recalls. Now Bob and his wife, Rosemary, are significant contributors to Michigan State as well as Siena Heights.

"If you can, you want to try to make the world a better place," Bob says, summing up his philosophy of giving. "And if we don't educate our kids, this world's going to be pretty sad."

Bob and Rosemary live at Devil's Lake and enjoy winter get-aways on Marco Island in Florida. Bob has been a member of the Board of Trustees since 1997 and serves on the Board's Student Life Committee. He also is a member of the Campaign Steering Committee.

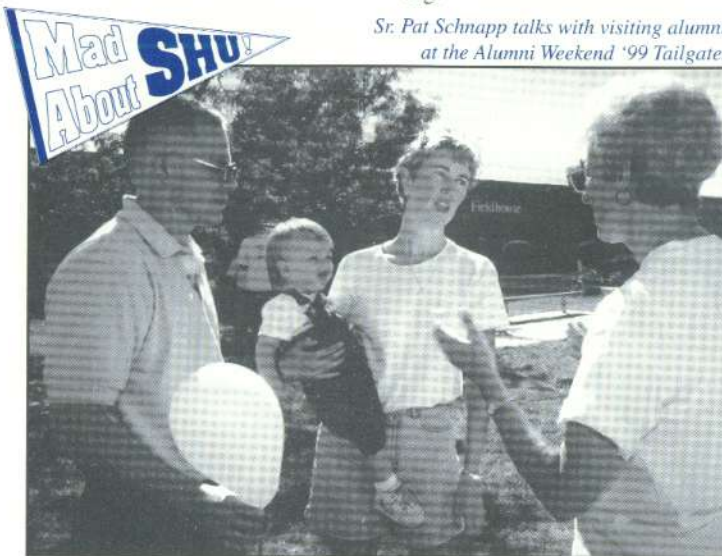

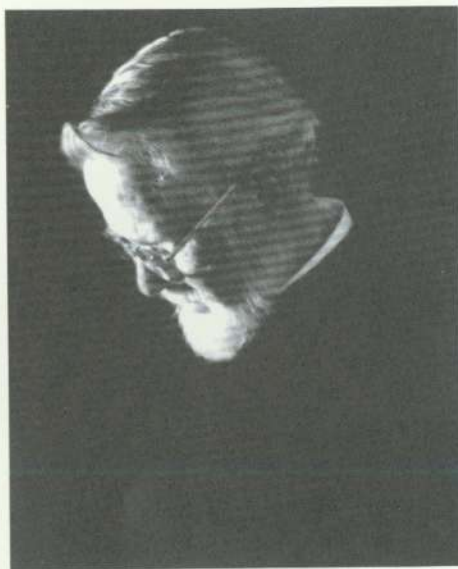

Remembering David VanHorn

Father David J. VanHorn, C.P.P.S.
1928 - 1999

Father David VanHorn, a member of the Studio Angelico faculty at Siena Heights for 27 years, died September 15. At a memorial service September 26 during Alumni Weekend, colleagues and former students recalled with affection and respect the man who taught them about art and life, who conducted their marriage ceremonies and baptized their children, and who always gave and demanded a 100-percent intellectual effort. The following tribute originally appeared in the Sept. 24 issue of Spectra, the Siena Heights student newspaper.

Beloved teacher, mentor, cherished friend. In life, David followed three callings: artist, teacher, priest.

His fondest childhood memory was receiving his first set of building blocks at age 2-1/2; David always felt this was the beginning of his artistic career. He received his B.F.A. degree in 1961 at the Dayton Art Institute and his M.F.A. degree at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. He specialized in ceramics and ceramic glazes, receiving a Fullbright Scholarship to study at the School of Ceramics in Faenza, Italy. Exhibitions of his work have been shown throughout Michigan. His artistic peers speak of his mastery of technique, the sophistication of his presentation, and the spiritual nature of his work.

David became a priest of the Missionaries of the Precious Blood in 1954. His field of study was biblical interpretation, and he continually read the bibles and books of worship of all faiths. Up to the time of his death, he said mass daily at a private altar in his home at Manitou Beach.

He began teaching in Studio Angelico 1970, retiring from there in 1997. During his tenure, he received the Most Effective Teacher Award in 1975 and the Outstanding Teacher Award in 1982. He brought distinction to the university by receiving a national award as an outstanding educator in 1972, Michigan Professor of the Year award in 1988, and a bronze medal from the Council for Advancement and Support for Education again in 1988. David taught seven art history courses in the Studio as well as two design courses.

His students speak of his passion for art history, especially the art of Black Africa/Afro-America. He was loved and respected for his ability to awaken questions and a desire for learning in his students; for his ability to value each individual's talents and skills and help in their development; for his ability to cause students to think in new and growing ways; for his presence, accessibility and care for each individual; for his being a role model as a practicing artist; and for his commitment in advising students to help them attain their best.

His legacy lives on within the heart of each student with whom he came in contact.

David is survived by his mother, Mrs. Alice Scudder, his sister, Paula, and his brother, Robert.
